Ottumwa Player Is Awarded to American League Team.

CINCINNATI, O., Dec. 6.—Player Beaver, formerly of the Ottumwa (Ia.) club, was declared to belong to the Detroit American League club in a decision announced today by Chairman Herrmann of the National Baseball Commission.

The case was presented by Manager Watkins of the Minneapolis American Association club, who, under a contract with the Ottumwa management, was to take his pick of the Ottumwa players at the close of the season, but claimed that the sale of Beaver to Detroit was contrary to this contract. However, it was shown that the sale had been made properly some time before the end of the season and the player was awarded to Detroit.

A request, in one of the submitted letters, for Watkins to "cover" some of the Ottumwa players against draft is the occasion for the commission to append to this decision a statement that had such an agreement been entered into each party should have been fined \$500 under the terms of the national agreement.

## FIVE-MILE RACING COURSE TO BE BUILT

Automobilists Promoting Erection of Great Track in This State for Auto Purposes.

NEAT SUM HAS BEEN RAISED

Manufacturers All Over Country Will Be Asked to Contribute.

A move is on foot, at the back of which are all the prominent automobilists of this city and State, to erect in Indiana a five-mile auto track which will be the finest of its kind in the world and will be an ideal place for holding all of the big meets of this country. Already \$7,000 has been subscribed by the automobile manufacturers of this city and this amount has practically come unsolicited. Within a very short time the matter will be presented to the various auto dealers of the State and country and the promoters do not think they will experience any great amount of difficulty in raising a sufficient sum to build the sort of course they are planning.

When the matter was first brought up for consideration an effort was made to secure an option on the race track at French Lick Springs, but the promoters were refused the one-time famous Indiana racing course. It now seems to be up to the men behind the movement to either purchase or lease a strip of land, and this will be done just as soon as a desirable location can be secured for the erection of the gigantic track.

Carl Fisher, in speaking of the proposed track, said yesterday: "We are looking for a piece of level land some place in the State where we can secure at least 300 acres, for it will be necessary to secure this amount to build the track and also all of the necessary adjuncts to such a place. The track which will be five miles in circumference, and will not be very wide, so drivers will have an opportunity to get in their great work on a straight-away stretch. The present plans, if carried out, will give the country the sort of a course it has been in need of for many years."

PREPARATIONS FOR ORMOND RACES

Aside from devoting considerable time to the proposed race course Mr. Fisher is also making plans for his campaign at the coming Ormond races, which will be held from Jan. 22 to the 27th on the Southern coast. Mr. Fisher will enter five of the twenty-six events, all of which are for heavyweight and stock stripped touring cars. The first race in which Mr. Fisher will be entered will be the opening event of the program and will be 100 miles international for the Minneapolis trophy cup. He will also enter all of the heavyweight class events and the speed trials for stock cars.

The National machine, which will be driven by Mr. Fisher is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready for speed trials some time this month. An exact duplicate of the car to be driven in the Southern races will be exhibited at the coming auto show in New York city.

The Indianapolis Racing Association has already commenced plans for next season and this city will see some of the finest racing that has ever been held on an Indiana track. Indianapolis boasts of more auto manufacturing than any other city in the country and these companies will take this means of introducing their cars to the country.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Dec. 6.—The Purdue Athletic Association met in annual session tonight and elected the following officers: President, F. E. Howe; vice president, Ernest East; secretary, E. T. Chase; director at large, L. E. Endsley; delegate to the Indiana Interscholastic Association, Prof. A. P. Jamison; members of the Insignia Board, Prof. Michael Golden, D. Long, G. H. Sage, C. C. Sherwood, Albert Miller.

The report of Treasurer Mueller of the association was presented and received with enthusiasm, showing the most successful season in the history of the Purdue athletics from a financial standpoint. The receipts from football were \$17,792.49, expenses \$12,408.08. This will leave a net balance on hand after all indebtedness of the association is paid of \$7,435.73.

The constitution was amended to read that any member of the association making one point at a conference meet will be entitled to the college letter "P." ### ALUMNI CONDEMNS ARTICLE.

Graduates Declare That Harvard Story Should Never Have Been Printed.

BOSTON, Dec. 6.—An editorial protest of the publication in the Harvard Graduate's Magazine of an article favoring the severance of Harvard of athletic relations with Yale is contained in this week's issue of the Harvard Bulletin, the official organ of the Harvard Graduates' Athletic Association, which appeared today.

The Bulletin declares that the attack on not only the Athletic but also the educational activities of Yale found in the magazine article does not have the approval of a great majority of the Harvard graduates, and it expresses its belief that the article is heartily condemned by the majority.

Remarking that, although the Graduate's Magazine is an unofficial publication, its influence is almost as great as if it were official, the Bulletin makes the point that for this reason the article containing the attack on Yale should have been signed, it declares, however, that the article should never have been printed.
