**CROWN POINT, Ind., June 16.**—With the course getting into lightning fast shape, the fourteen drivers who will participate in the Indiana trophy and Cobe cup races on the Crown Point speedway next Friday and Saturday were again out early reeling off miles at terrific speed in practice for the big races later in the week. As a result of yesterday's and today's constant practice, the drivers are becoming intimately acquainted with the crooks and turns of the course, and have been able slowly to decrease the time of their practice spins.

There was considerable dispute among the racers over the time of Strang on a trial round yesterday. The timers in the grand stand caught Strang's time for the course at 21 minutes flat, an average speed of sixty-five miles an hour. Unofficial clockers, who also caught his time, declared it was 24 minutes flat, which would make an average of fifty-seven miles an hour. Even that speed on such a crooked course is "going some," they say.

Strang's time is the record for the course so far, the nearest approach being that made by Burman, who reeled the course off in 25 minutes. Chevrolet, one time hero of the Vanderbilt cup race, arrived at the course yesterday afternoon, and made his trial round in 25 minutes.

### Illinois Soldiers Coming.

Meanwhile, the First regiment of Infantry, Illinois National Guard, is preparing to invade Indiana in heavy marching order tomorrow night. Colonel Sanborn, commanding the regiment, will take one thousand men across the Hoosier line, and they will be stationed at Crown Point during the races, in order to police the course and eliminate the chance of accidents.

Chicago society has entered into the spirit of the cup races with zeal, and numerous "daylight parties" have been arranged for both days of the races. Special trains will leave Chicago every twenty minutes on Friday and Saturday, and it is expected some fifty thousand to sixty thousand persons will witness the races.

Referee Asa Payne, starter Fred Wagner and other race officials were expected before night. Mr. Wagner, among numerous other events, has started every Vanderbilt race so far run.

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**Drivers Try New Signals.**

Signal systems for the guidance of drivers were tried out by the Locomobile, Stoddard-Dayton and Apperson cars today. Ordinary means of signaling are useless to a pilot going at the rate of a mile a minute or so. Through the mist of dust and oil spray he must be made to see his signals without distracting his attention from his steering wheel. The system used today was imported from France and employs both numerals and arbitrary characters. They are placed on billboards twenty feet high and are easily changed. The boards are placed at curves where the cars are compelled to slow down, giving the driver and his machinist a chance to learn what lap they are on—a thing easy to lose track of in a hard, jolting race—the speed they are making, distance ahead or behind the leading car, whether the car ahead seems liable to slacken and whether in the judgment of the race manager speed should be increased.
