



vicinity of the course during the night

and early morning. Hundreds of automobile parties will be forming in Chicago at dawn and striking southward for the shrine where for two days the auto fans will worship the speed god. Until 7 a. m. vehicles will be permitted

Point to the main grandstand, and hundreds of buses and other vehicles will be on hand to transport spectators from the trains to the course. Once within the course access to the grandstand will be gained by foot bridges at the starting point. More than 200,000 persons fare expected
