TWO STAR DRIVERS HERE FOR BIG RACE

Hearne and Hughes Arrive for Speedway Event—De Palma Expected Today.

NATIONALS DRIVE 275 MILES

Wilcox and Aitken Test Tires in Morning Dash—Oldfield Will Come.

Eddie Hearne, the Chicago driver who will team with Caleb Bragg and Bruce Brown at the wheel of the three Fiat cars in the 500-mile race at the Speedway Memorial day, arrived yesterday, accompanied by Harry T. Clinton, the Chicago representative of the Fiat company.

Another driver named for the big event came in yesterday in the person of "Lord" Hughie Hughes, who is nominated to drive a Mercer in the race. Both Hearne and Hughes are expecting their cars in this morning and hope to get on the track in the afternoon. Hearne has driven on the Speedway before, twice winning the Speedway Helmet, in July and September 1910, the 100-mile free-for-all and the ten-mile free-for-all during the September meeting.

"Happy Johnny" Aitken and "Howdy" Wilcox yesterday drove 275 miles apiece at the Speedway. A. C. Newby of the National company, who watched the drivers working their cars out, did not intend when the test was planned to drive the cars more than 200 miles and this was to be done mainly to get a line on the tire proposition. When the 200-mile mark was reached and the cars were still running like clockwork, the drivers pushed the big blue cars another seventy-five miles and the test was satisfactory to the National company. The question of tires will be the all-important part of the race as the pitmen will figure in winning the race, and changing tires will be one of the most important details.

Will Be One of Stars Entered in Circuit Free-for-All in July Others to Start.

The fastest trotters in the country are the Grand Circuit in 1:58 1/2, who is usually reserved for exhibition miles, owner, and The Harvester, 2:01, will be started late on account of not having been used in the stud this spring.
