

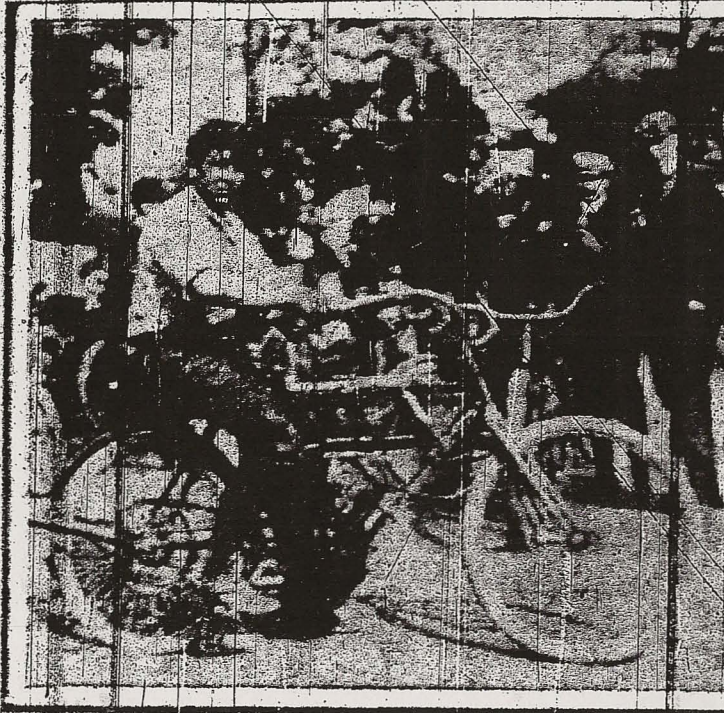

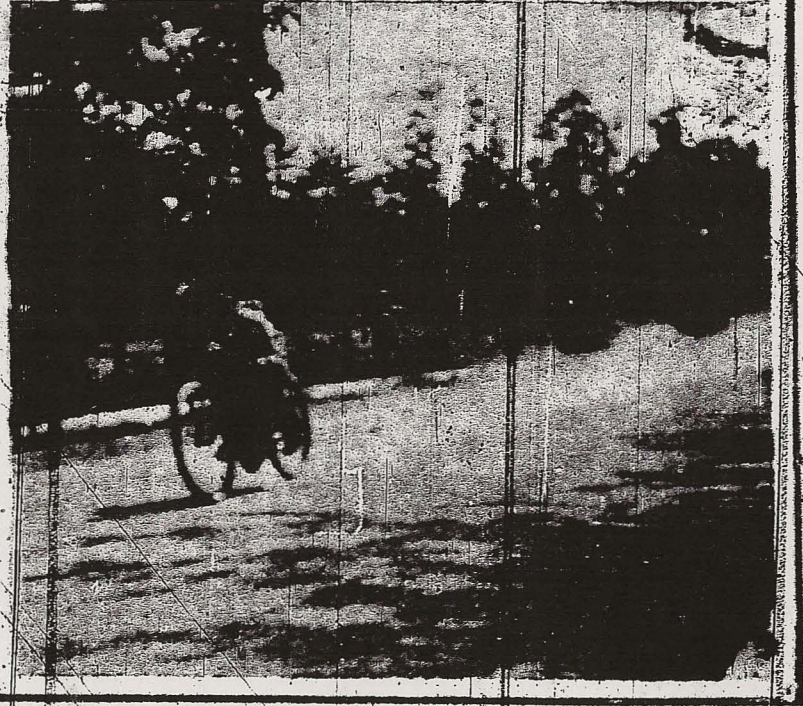

MOTOR SPEEDWAY WORK IS NEARING COMPLETION

ARMY OF WORKMEN RUSHING BIG PROJECT.

READY FOR MOTORCYCLISTS

Up to Friday there had been places on the new Indianapolis motor speedway ninety thousand wagonloads of stone or about ninety thousand cubic yards. There is a siding capable of holding fifteen cars at the ground and others are brought out as fast as these fifteen cars can be emptied. Forty carloads of pitch was the first order for the track and more will have to be bought before the track is completed. The pitch or taroid is put on two gallons to the square yard.

The crushed stone is being bought of sixteen different firms over the country, as one firm could not supply it fast enough. Three sizes of stone are used in constructing the track. Work on the different stands, repair pits and auto houses is going on rapidly and all will be in readiness when the first events on the track are scheduled during the motor-cycle meet August 15 and 14.

Indianapolis Rider Wins.

Erwin G. Baker, the local motorcycle racer, returned from Troy, O., yesterday, where he participated in five motor-cycle races held there Saturday. He won three first places and two second places. In the last two races he was unable to overcome the handicap imposed on him against the remainder of the field, being beaten in both events by small margins. His prizes consist of two handsome silver cups and three merchandise prizes. His fastest mile on the half-mile track was 1:18. He received a prize for the fastest mile made in the meet. His time of 1:18 is considered good for a flat dirt track, as at no time can a machine be let out except on the short straightaways. Baker used a Hubert power Indian. He is entered in all the races at the speedway, August 15-14.
