

ENDURANCE RUN STARTS FROM CLEVELAND EARLY

MOTORCYCLISTS BEGIN TRIP TO INDIANAPOLIS AT SIX O'CLOCK.

NINETY-NINE IN CAVALCADE

CLEVELAND, O., August 10.—Under ideal weather conditions the start of the annual endurance run of the Federation of American Motorcyclists was made from here today. Indianapolis is the finishing point.

Ninety-nine entries were at the tape when the official car left to spread the route with confetti to guide the riders. The first four contestants were sent off at 6 o'clock, and others followed in divisions of four at one-minute intervals. The riders were expected to cover an average of twenty miles an hour. The first stop was at Coshocton, O. At Newark a slight rest will be taken during the afternoon and they are to arrive in Columbus early this evening. Wednesday morning they will resume the trip, stopping at Dayton, O., and Richmond, Ind., before completing the trip to Indianapolis.

WOOSTER FIRST STATION.

Motorcyclists Meet Two Accidents on First Lap.

WOOSTER, O., August 10.—A trail of dust and the echo of steady exhausts marked the trail of the ninety-nine entrants as they swept through this city today on the annual reliability contest of the Federation of American Motorcyclists from Cleveland to Indianapolis. Two accidents marked the run to this city, the first checking station. W. G. Moss, of Dayton, riding a New Era, was ditched by a pile of gravel near Seville. His machine was uninjured and he continued without delay. H. A. Peterson, of Buffalo, on a Topeka, was thrown from his machine and run over by Frank Allerman and H. E. Underhill a short distance from Cleveland. The machine was damaged and Peterson sustained a severe injury to his knee, but stuck gamely to the contest and reached this city only ten minutes behind schedule. L. J. Mueller, captain of the Cleveland Motorcycle Club, and his riding partner, P. B. Whitney, were the first to register here. Good roads made the run to this city practically easy.

Young Fitzgerald Surprised.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., August 10.—Young Fitzgerald, of Milwaukee, met with a surprise last night when he faced Joe Mandot, a Creole boxer from Louisiana, the southerner showing fast foot work and enough skill to stay eight rounds, the limit. Referee Redmon awarded the decision to Fitzgerald on his showing in the last two rounds. Kid Gardner knocked out Indian Joe in three rounds.

He had them by the nape of the neck all the way. Nick Carter also pitched a strong game, but he was found for two singles in the same inning that he issued a base on balls, and these, with a sacrifice, took the game away from him.

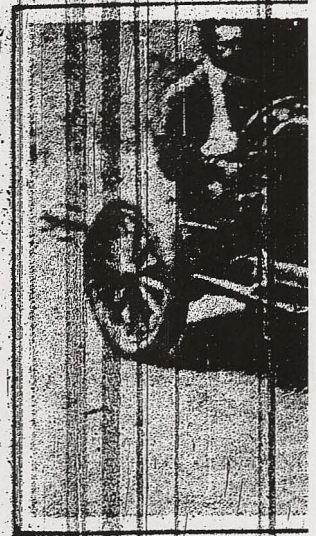

One Run Off Slagle.

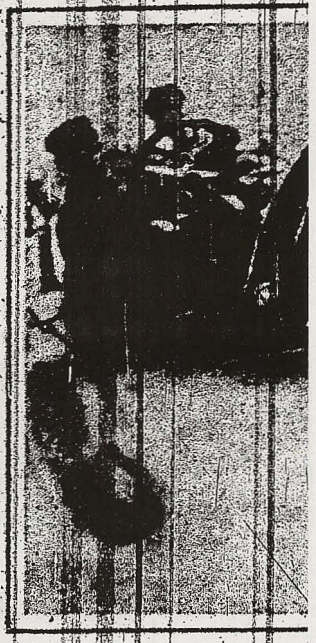

OFFICIAL ENTRIES OUT FOR MOTORCYCLE RACES

LEADING RIDERS OF THE WORLD WILL COMPETE.

EXPECT TO SET NEW RECORDS

Official entries for the national championship motorcycle races on the new Indianapolis motor speedway, Friday and Saturday afternoon, have closed, and the list includes almost all the celebrated riders in the world. Riders who have tested the track predict that all records will be smashed before the program has been finished. The official entry list now includes more than one hundred names, and among them are the most celebrated in the motorcycle world, including professional champion Jake DeRoster and amateur champion Stanley Kellogg.

Everything is in readiness for the national motorcycle convention and races. The arrival of the army of endurance run riders from Cleveland, tomorrow afternoon, will be the first big event to attract public attention, and the monster parade through the principal streets of the city, Thursday afternoon, is expected to attract the attention of thousands of spectators. The race programs will start at 1:30 Friday and Saturday afternoon at the speedway. Big Four trains will be run to the speedway on a fifteen-minute schedule, and interurban cars will also carry big crowds. The management expects fifty thousand people to witness the speed events during the two days.
