AUTO NEARS CHICAGO

PLOW PRECEDES AMERICANS

Italians, Angered by Refusal of Traction Right of Way, Get Sympathy.

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., Feb. 23.—The
Thomas car in the New York-Paris race
reached here at 10 o'clock tonight, hav-
ing covered twenty-two miles over a road

the car was towed by twelve horses while
a four-horse snow plow went ahead. The
car started west at 11 o'clock tonight.

Dissensions have broken out between
the Americans and the foreign drivers.
When the Zust car got to Goshen, Sar-
tori, the driver, learned that the Ameri-
can car had gone over the right of way
of the Northern Indiana Railway from
Goshen to South Bend. Sartori asked for
this same privilege, but was refused, ac-
cording to his story. President E. S. Mul-
holland of the electric line said that un-
der no circumstances would he allow any
but the American-made cars to go over
his tracks.

Paul Picard of Chicago, who is in Mich-
igan City with his machine, said that he
would not help the Thomas car on the
way to Chicago, but would wait for the
French and Italian cars. Picard said also
that he had talked to Jack Banta of the
Chicago Automobile Club, who is at Ches-
terton with his car to act as pilot, and
that Banta also would refuse to help the
Thomas car.

"I will help only the men who are racing
fairly," said Picard. "The act of the
Thomas is the kind of thing that casts a

ITALIANS REACH SOUTH BEND.

Studebaker Lost in Drifts and Sperry Gives Up.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Feb. 23.—The Italian car in the New York-Paris endurance contest arrived in South Bend at 8 o'clock tonight after having fought its way through heavy roads between Kendallville and South Bend. The car took up the greater part of the afternoon and evening in making the seventeen miles this side of Elkhart.

The Thomas car pilot car, in charge of Jack Sperry, arrived in South Bend at 12:45 this morning and attempted to proceed on to Michigan City. After going two and a half miles west of South Bend the car was obliged to return to this city, the snowdrifts being so high as to make it impossible for the automobile to cover any ground. The car will be shipped back to Detroit, Sperry being ill.

The Studebaker car, which is carrying a dispatch from Gen. Fred Grant to the commanding officer at Ft. Leavenworth, Kas., is lost somewhere between Ligonier and Goshen, Ind. The car left Ligonier early this morning, but up to 8 o'clock tonight had not reached Goshen. The Italian car left for Michigan City at 8:20 p. m.
