INDIANAPOLIS TO HAVE AUTO SHOW

Matter Has Been Settled by Lo cal Dealers and Plans for Affair Now Under Way.

NEW TRACK MAY BE BUILT

Two-Mile Course for Fair Grounds Being Discussed.

Indianapolis will have an open-air aute show this fall, whether it be national or local in its character. This is the statement made by Carl Fisher yesterday alternoon to a representative of The Star.

Mr. Fisher is at the head of the move ment to hold the show and is now busily engaged making plans for the holding of one of the most gigantic open-air shows that has ever been held in the country. the national association refuses to award this city the open-air show scheduled for next fall the action will in no way affect the plans that are under way at the pres-ent time.

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The next meeting of the national association will be held in June in the Beat and at the time of the meeting several cities will be presented to the Board of Directors as applicants for the first openair show of the auto. The name of indianapolis will be urged by many of the manufacturors, but Cleveland, Columbus and Buffalo also have their following and will be aspirants for the honor of holding the show.

OPEN-AIR SHOW THE TALK

Since the recent show at Chicago the talk of the open-air show has overshadowed everything else, and now the outdoor display is looked upon as the only real way in which to exhibit the carrowing to the many adventages it has over the indoor affair. With all this sentiment favoring the outdoor show there is also an undercurrent of talk concerning the logical place for holding the show, and Indianapolis is spoken of in most ossess as the one and only place for such an exhibit on account of the facilities of the country of the control of the c

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While the plans for the show are still immature it is practically settled that September or October will see Indianapolis in the market as one of the great show centers in the world of the automobile. The show will undoubtedly be held at the Fair Grounds.

Mr. Fisher said yesterday afternoon in speaking of the show: "I have been working on this sort of an affair for Indianapolis for some time pust and I confidently expect the show will be the greatest thing of its nature ever pulled off in the West. It surely will be from a demonstrative standpoint, as the outdoor show will give all of the factories a chance to display their machines, which has always been one of the factories a chance to display their machines, which has always been one of the farewbacks of the indoor show."

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
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OPEN-AIR SHOW THE TALK

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But should the National Association see fit to overlook the demands of the majority in the matter and award the openair show to some other city, Indianapolis will have a show of its own, which will in every respect be just as large and complete as any that has been given. Mr. Fisher, who has been working on the atfair for more than a week, has aiready secured pledges from twelve of the largest factories in Ohio, Illinois and Michigan to exhibit in this city in the fall, and if those factories send displays to this city the other big concerns of the country will have to fall into line to protect themselves and their interests in the auto world.

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Mr. Fisher said that he would at once petition the State Board of Agriculture to erect a track around the entire outer edge of the Fair Grounds. "This would give the association a track almost two miles in circumference," said Mr. Fisher.

The plan at the present time is to hold a race meet of two or three days in connection with the auto shows, which would give the visitors in the city a chance not only to inspect the various makes of machines, but would also give them a chance to see the big machines in races and would give the manufacturers an opportunity to try out their machines before the oup races. 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INDIANA ASSOCIATION.

The matter of forming an Indiana association to promote the coming show will be taken up at once. Mr. Fisher has written to all of the prominent manufacturers of the State, and it is quite possible that within the month a body will be organized and active steps taken to interest all of the big dealers of the country.

Indianapolis is bound to be one of the greatest automobile markets of the world on account of the great number of autofactories in this city and State and the prominent men in this line are taking the matter by the forelock and intend making it not only the greatest city in the point of output, but also as a display market. The plan to erect a five-mile track in this State is progressing nicely and it is quite probable that Indiana will also be favored with one of the greatest race courses in the country. The proposition to erect the course at French Lick has been abandoned by the promoters, owing to the fact that, according to the statement of a prominent engineer, it would be impossible to secure a tract of land large enough for such a course at the popular resort. Several other Indiana sites have been suggested and it is quite probable that the proposed course may be erected closer to Indianapolis.
