for the options listed below, can, by adding the necessary parts, be assembled into a complete stock car (see stock car definition). Options permitted: Lighter rear springs; change of steering post angle; change of driving gear ratio, wheel diameters excepted; tire and rim equipment; style of dash, seat and body equipment; form, volume and location of fuel and oil tanks (system employed in either case must remain unchanged); exhaust header and exhaust pipe (except as limited by Rule No. 50, governing direction of exhaust); use of shock absorbers; winding
