Hamilton Hi Defeated By Springfield Boys

Coach Bowman Erred by Putting Second Team Players in The Game

Three important factors stood out boldly in the football game on Saturday afternoon when the Hamilton high school team was defeated for the first time this year. The husky warriors from Springfield were the ones to turn the trick by a score of 10 to 7.

The first thing which contributed largely to the defeat of the local squad was the inefficient manner in which Coach Bowman handled the team. He was so absolutely confident that his team would easily beat Springfield that he started two members of the second team on the ends. Not detracting anything from the good games these boys put up it remains that Bowman should be criticized for not starting his strongest team and if the game proved to be a walk-away then he could put in some of the second string men.

Another thing which helped Springfield was the playing of House. This player by his "bear-hug" and "foot-work" caused the locals to lose sixty yards by penalties. Two fifteen-yard penalties came at times when Hamilton was within their opponent's ten-yard line and killed off all chances for possible scores.

The third and deciding factor was the classy football played by the Springfield boys. Their interference was great and they always covered every play well.

THE GAME.

First Quarter.

Hamilton chose to receive at the south goal. Stone kicked to Jackman on the 20 yard line. Jackman took it back 35 yards before being downed. On a fake kick House chased around the left end for 11 yards. Jackman bucked for 1 yard. Some one walked through the Hamilton defense and nailed Black for a 5 yard loss. House punted to Bayler who was downed in his tracks. Springfield was only able to get 3 yards in three downs and Stone punted to Millikin. Millikin returned the ball 10 yards. Stewart threw a forward pass without looking and Joyce didn't know it was coming. Stone caught the pass and raced to the 15 yard line. Line plunges made it first down for Springfield on Hamilton's 3 yard line. Clarke bucked through Eyer for the touchdown. Stone kicked goal. Score: Springfield 7, Hamilton 0.

Second Quarter.

Egry and Pietsch went in for Joyce and Beeler. Stone punted to Black who was downed in his tracks by Crist. Black went around right end without any interference for 15 yards. He made 5 more around left end. Jackman bucked the line for 3 yards. Stewart made it first down through center. Black, Millikin and Jackman made another first down. Jackman went through the center of the line for 12 yards. Black tore around right end for 9 yards. Millikin made it first down on Springfield's 13 yard line. For three downs Springfield held and then Black shot a forward to Millikin but he lacked 4 inches of making first down. Stone punted to Black who brought the ball back to the 21 yard line. Stewart tossed the ball to Pietsch for a 23 yard gain. The ball was on Springfield's 1 yard line. It took four downs to put it over. Stewart finally made the last 6 inches. Stewart kicked goal. Score: Springfield 7, Hamilton 7.

Third Quarter.

Stewart kicked to Crist. Stone made a long punt the ball rolling over the goal line for a touchback. The ball was put in play on the 20 yard line. House punted to Wright. House was holding and Hamilton was shoved back 15 yards. Stone's kick from placement failed. Just as the half ended Black threw a forward to Egry and it looked like he was going for a touchdown but Crist got him in Springfield's 35 yard line.

Fourth Quarter.

Stewart instead of trying to fit the score with a drop kick called for a forward pass on the fourth down. It failed and the ball went to Springfield. Stone punted to Stewart who returned the ball 5 yards. House punted out of bounds on Springfield's 11 yard line. Stone punted to Black who carried the ball to the 15 yard line. A fumble gave Springfield the ball. Stone punted to Black on the 32 yard line. Black threw a forward to Stewart who was downed on the 18 yard line. A long forward over the line from Black to Pietsch was almost good. Pietsch had the ball in his hands but it bounced out. It was a piece of tough luck for had he held the ball the game would have been won. It was Springfield's ball on the 20 yard line. Stone made 26 yards around the ends and then kicked to Black on Hamilton's 15 yard line. Black tossed a forward to Pietsch for a 35 yard gain. Four successive forward passes failed and the ball went to Springfield in the center of the field. Stone punted out of bounds on the 35 yard line. A forward pass was intercepted. Stone punted over the goal line and it was Hamilton's ball on the 20 yard line. Stewart to Pietsch by the air route gained 40 yards. Springfield intercepted a forward pass on its own 20 yard line as the whistle sounded. Final score: Springfield 10, Hamilton 7.

The injured: John Ghianda, Los Angeles, Jackson's mechanic. J. S. Hamigan, Los Angeles, spectator. Jackson, a Los Angeles driver, on his thirteenth lap, swerved into one of the palm trees lining the course. The car upset the first palm tree it struck, overturned a lemonade stand, killing the woman in charge, crushed Jenkins against a second palm which was broken off short and wrapped itself about a third tree. In this wreckage Jackson was crushed and his body nearly cut in two. His mechanic Ghianda, was thrown out and escaped dangerous injuries.
