HARVARD PUTS ITHACA BAND OUT OF FIGHT

Al Sharpe's Cornell Champions Look Like Bushers Against Percy Haughton's Stars.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 28.—The Harvard football team shattered the championship aspirations of the Cornell eleven here this afternoon when it routed the big team from Ithaca, 23 to 0. Harvard was far superior to Cornell as the score indicates.

The Crimson eleven outplayed and out-generaled the team from the shores of Lake Cayuga, and the Ithacans completed their own downfall by an exhibition of erratic football that stunned the Harvard fans who had many wagers at odds of five to four that Cornell would duplicate the victory of a year ago. Tonight Harvard supporters are hailing Coach Haughton as the "Miracle man" of yore.

New Style of Play.

They appeared to upset Cornell. The entire play during the first period was in Cornell territory and the eleven from Ithaca lost confidence and never appeared as a possible victor.

The Cornell players fumbled and tackled like nervous nines, and the Harvard drive or drive in their attack. There was little advantage one way or the other between the punting of Herriewen and that of Harvard, but Harvard was far superior to Cornell in rushing the ball, gaining an average of nearly five yards a try, while the Red machine did not average better than three or four yards a try.

Robinson Scores Goal.

The visitors' initial score came in the first period. Sherrick punted to his 40-yard line, where on the first lineup, Casey reached Cornell's 30-yard line, a triple pass, following two line plunges, put the ball on Cornell's 15-yard line just as the period ended. On the second scrimmage of the succeeding period, Casey dashed through center for a touchdown, from which Robinson failed to kick.

THOMAS HALE. WHEN the Interstate Association for the Encouragement of Trapshooting met last night, the eleven years ago made known that it would conduct a 100-target event from sixteen yards for the amateur trapshooting championships of each state. The champions to meet later to decide the amateur championship of the United States—there were many who thought the plan unwise, fearing that the event in each state would be won by the same shooter for many years.

Incidentally, Aitken defeated a field of twenty-two fast cars and drivers and took the lead and the championship from Darlo Resta, his chief rival for racing honors.

Resta, who was a favorite with the crowd, led for the greater part of the race up to the sixty-mile mark, when he had five laps to go. He was overtaken four miles farther on when he broke the crank shaft of his car. At that time, Resta won something like \$1500 in lap prizes to console him for his defeat.
