The Crimson eleven outplayed and outgenerated the team from the shores of Lake Cayuga, and the Ithacans completed their own downfall by an exhibition of erratic football that stunned their adherents, who had laid many wagers at odds of five to four that Cornell would duplicate the victory of a year ago. Tonight Harvard supporters are hailing Coach Haughton as the "Miracle man" of yore.

# AITKEN BREAKS ALL **AUTO RACE RECORDS**

Goes a Hundred Miles at

105.86 Gait; Resta Runs Even Faster,

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.- Johnny Aitken, in a Peugeot car, smashed all records in the race for the Harkness gold cup at Sheepshead Bay today by covering 100

Sheepshead Bay today by covering 160-miles in 56 minutes and 37 seconds, averaging 105.86 miles an hour. Incidentally, Aitken defeated a field of twenty-two fast cars and drivers and took the lead for the championship from Dario Resta, als chief rival for racing honors.

Frank Galvin, in a Premier car, astonished the crowd by finishing in second place in 56 minutes 45 seconds, only sight seconds behind the winner.

Wilcox, in another Peugeot, finished third in 57 minutes 10 seconds. Handerson, in a Maxwell, was fourth in 55:04, and Devore, in a Deugenberg, was fifth in 59:23.

Resta, who was a favorite with the crowd, ied for the greater part of the race up to the sixty-mile mark, when he had tire trouble. He had to withdraw four miles farther or when he broke the crank shaft of his car. At that, Resta won something like \$1500 in lap prizes to console him for his defent.

As a matter of fact, the real race was between Aitken and Resta, who drove at a terrific pace from the start, averaging better than 103 miles an hour for more than fifty miles, when both met with tire trouble. Then came 'the Resta accident, which put him out of the running.

Only a handful of spectators occupied the huge grandstand, despite perfect weather conditions.

There were fitteen starters in a fifty-mile special race for non-prize winners in the main event. This was won by Devigne, who drove Harry Harkness's car to victory in 28:40, averaging 104 miles an hour. Milton, in a Deusenberg car, was second; Meyers, in a Pugh car, was third, and Charles J. Doliain, another Deusenberg, was fourth.
