MARMON CAR WINNER OF LONG ATLANTA RACE

**HARROUN FINISHES FIRST
120-MILE EVENT**

FOUR CARS START CONTEST

ATLANTA, Ga., November 11.—A. W. Marrow, driving a Marion "B" model 100-mile stock touring car, 100 miles per hour automobile, came into town today, Sunday, in front of the Hotel Wren, about 10:30 A.M., in a blizzard and snowfall. He had just come from the 100-mile race, finished second, won six miles to the hour, the fastest time in the race.

On the ninth lap I started into a full lap of two miles on Harrold, and on the fifteenth mile he had gained a full mile, passing the latter in front of the engine. The crowd cheering. HARROUN FINISHES FIRST IN 120-MILE EVENT.

FOUR CARS START CONTEST

ATLANTA, Ga., November 11.—R. W. Harroun, driving a Marmon "32," won the 120-mile stock chassis race on the new automobile course here today, finishing in front of the other three contestants—Matson, in a Chalmers-Detroit; Basle, in a Renault, and Chevrolet, in a Buick. Harroun's time was 1:00:21. His car did not stop during the race. Matson, who finished second, was six miles behind, the Renault eighteen miles behind and the Buick the same. The Renault finished third and the Buick fourth.

On the tenth lap Chevrolet had gained a full lap of two miles on Basle, and on the fifteenth mile he had gained a lap on Matson, passing the latter in front of the stands, the crowd cheering. Chevrolet's engine caught fire at the beginning of the twenty-fifth mile, and he dropped behind two laps. Harroun taking the lead, with Matson second. Chevrolet's time averaged about 68.4 miles an hour. Harroun's time for thirty miles was 26:54.52.

Buick Car on Fire.

Chevrolet, after his trouble, overcame the Renault's lead, but caught fire again on his fortieth mile and again dropped to the rear. At the fiftieth mile Harroun, whose time was 44:48.92, was in the lead, with Matson about a mile behind. Matson unaccountably slowed up, but did not stop, and at the end of sixty miles the Marmon was about six miles in the lead of its nearest pursuer, the Chalmers-Detroit. The Buick was eight miles behind and the Renault ten. At the seventieth mile Harroun's time was 63:01.23. He was six miles ahead of Matson and ten miles in the lead of the Buick and Renault. The Renault had not made a stop, but Chevrolet was delayed for a third time, stopping on his sixtieth mile at the repair pit to adjust a strained valve.
