ROBERTSON IN FIAT CAR SETS NEW SPEED RECORD

PASSES AITKEN'S MARK ON INDIANAPOLIS TRACK.

MARMON IN EXCITING RACE

ATLANTA, Ga., November 23.—The fifty-mile free-for-all was the racing feature of yesterday's program at the new automobile speedway. The race was won by Robertson in the fast time of 40:14.02, which is a new world's record. The previous record was held by John Aitken and was made at the Indianapolis track in a National car. Aitken's time was 44:31.02. Aitken, in a National "40," was second, two laps behind Robertson. Stillman, in a Marmon "25," was third. Strang, in a 200-horse power Fiat, was the other contestant, and led for a time, but was forced to retire because of wire trouble. On the turn of the tenth mile the Chalmers-Detroit, driven by Lorimer, and the Aperson, with Harding at the wheel, collided and were badly wrecked. The drivers, however, escaped with slight injuries.

The twenty-four-mile race for stock chassis, 161 to 230 cubic inches, was a duel between Knipper and Matson, both driving Chalmers-Detroits. For nearly the entire distance the cars raced wheel to wheel, and on the last laps they were so close they appeared to be one machine. In the stretch Knipper forged ahead and won by ten feet.

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
