RACING AT ATLANTIC CITY.

Walter Christie Wins Main Event of the Afternoon's Program.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 26.—A
strong, cold wind blew up the automobile
race course this afternoon, making it un-
pleasant for spectators and drivers. All
things considered, however, the speeding
was satisfactory. The main event was the
competition of the big racing cars, in which
Walter Christie was finally a victor over S.
R. Stevens in the Darracq that won the
Vanderbilt Cup. This race was in two heats
and the first was won by Harry S. Houtp's
sixty-horse-power Thomas and the second
by Christie, and then the latter won final in
46 4-5.

Mrs. Joan Cuneo won the second trial for
gasoline runabouts with a ten-horse-power
Maxwell in 1:25 3-5. The next best time
was made by Mrs. Ernst Rogers in a ten-
horse-power Maxwell in 1:31.

H. M. Harding, driver of the English
Daimler, protested the final heat for tour-
ing cars of fifty horse power or less, because
of a false start. His companion drivers said
it was a misunderstanding and it was agreed
to run the race Friday.
