## Rugs Tell Old Stories.

"There are some pretty stories in these ancient tiles and rugs," said a man who has spent much of his time in Persia and other Eastern countries gathering antique productions. "Of course unless you know how to read them the figures on the tiles and rugs seem extremely rude. But if you know how to interpret them it is different.

"Here is a tile, for example, which carries a pretty myth. It is the story of the first dervish of Persia. A dervish is a Persian monk who professes great poverty and lives a secluded life. He is supposed to have no more property than may be carried in a coconut shell.

"This tile bears the figures of a woman and a man. The woman is endeavoring to tempt the man to drink wine, but like the true dervish he is refusing. Just below is the figure of a worldly man with wine glass upturned. The story which is conveyed by the tile is the life history of Hadja Hofis, the first Persian monk, or dervish.

"Hadja Hofis was a baker. He became enamored of a beautiful woman, but it was necessary for him to earn what in our money is equal to \$100 in order to win favor with her. Impelled by his mad love Harja Hofis worked more than forty years in order to earn this sum of money. But when he had earned his money he went to the mosque and fell asleep and there had a vision in which he was called to preach the faith of Mahomet. Immediately he disposed of his money, divested himself of all raiment except a light skin covering and started out to preach the faith of the prophet Mahomet. He began a pilgrimage and on this pilgrimage he took with him a coconut shell in which he was supposed to put all of his earthly possessions."

Even to this day the dervishes carry copper vessels fashioned in the shape of coconut shells.

Among other curios in his possession are some antique copper platters with engraved characters expressing the poems of the Persians. He is unable to read the full meaning of these poems, but he knows the general text. One holds the same meaning as the golden rule. It means "Be kind to everyone." Some of these copper vessels procured in Ispahan bear inscriptions which go back to the time of Moses.

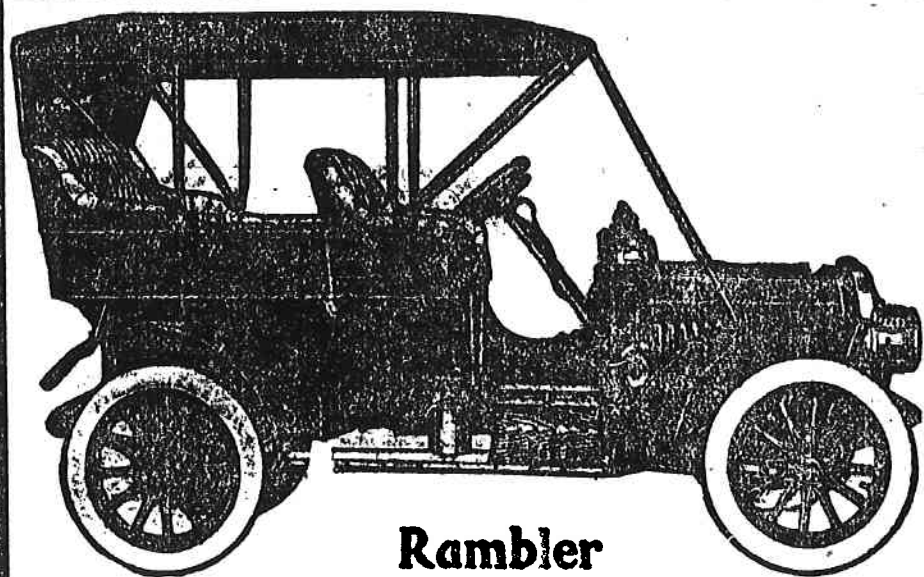

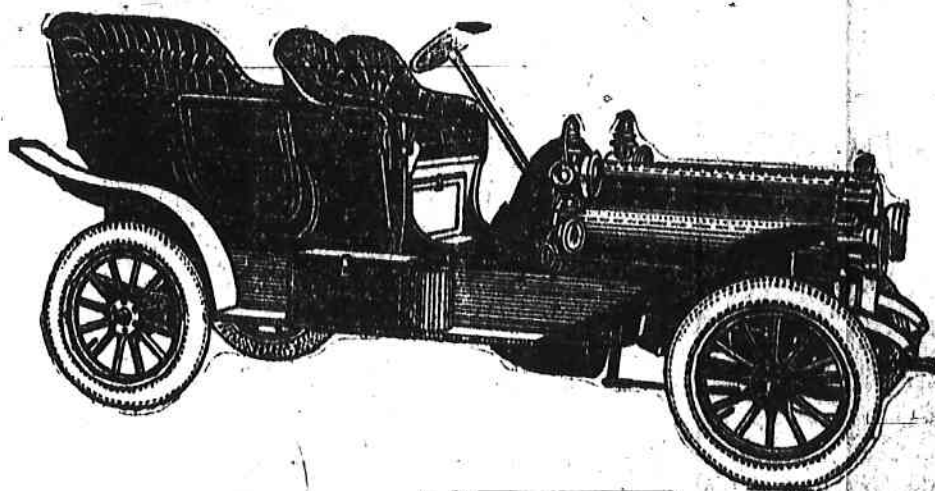

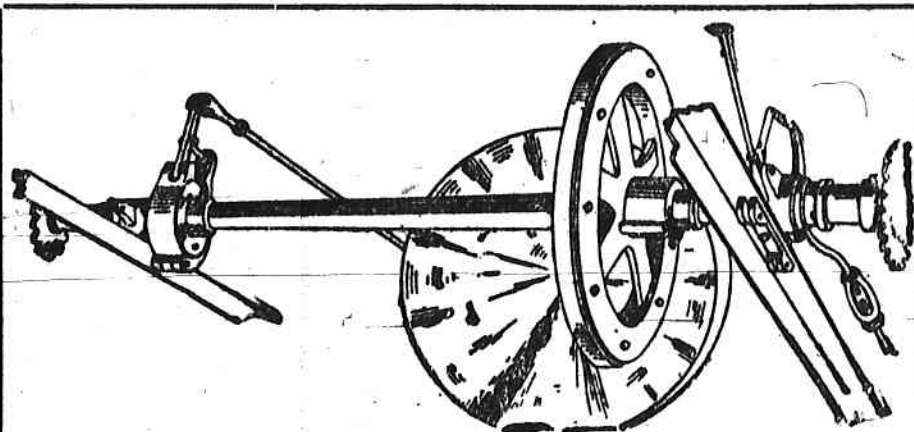

# MINDFUL OF CHILDREN

## MAYOR FAVORS PLAYGROUNDS

### City Administration Announces Purpose of Establishing Breathing Places.

The question of playgrounds for Indianapolis children has just been brought prominently to the minds of the city administration, and the officials are beginning to consider ways of opening up breathing spots for the youngsters all over the city. "I am very anxious that Indianapolis should do something toward the establishment of playgrounds in all parts of the city for the benefit of the children of Indianapolis," said Mayor Bookwalter yesterday. "I believe that no more profitable expenditure of money can be made than to provide in at least a dozen places small playgrounds equipped with cheap and simple devices. I have always intended in the budget of 1908 to include an appropriation for this purpose."

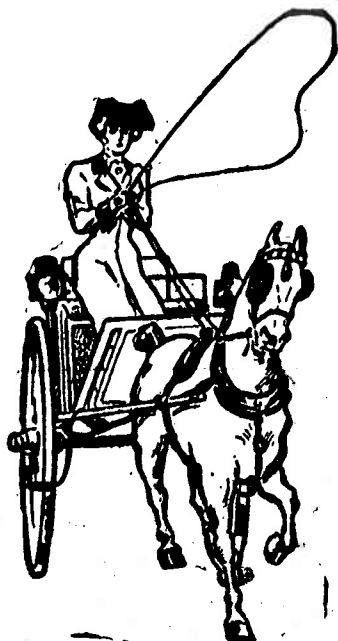
J. Clyde Power, superintendent of parks, expressed himself as being in hearty sympathy with the idea of numerous small playgrounds scattered throughout the city, and one large central playground. "A good location for the central playground," said Mr. Power, "would be the present grounds of the institution for the deaf on East Washington street, which will be vacated when the institution is moved to its new quarters. The location is ideal and the grounds are all that can be desired. The present structures could be cut down and refitted for indoor sports."

"As for the smaller playgrounds I believe that they should be fitted up on school grounds and should be opened during the vacation months as well as the months of school. Each park should also contain playgrounds, but the parks are so scattered and so far distant from certain parts of the city that all children could not be accommodated. "But

the whole question," said Mr. Power, "is one that should be dealt with by the school authorities rather than by the park authorities."

At the request of Henry B. F. Macfarland of Washington City, vice president of the Playground Association of America, Indianapolis will be represented in the meeting of the association to be held

in Chicago in the near future. Charles E. Coffin, chairman of the Board of Park Commissioners, informed Mayor Bookwalter yesterday that he would attend the meeting, and it is probable also that Superintendent Power will attend. The Department of Public Health and the School Board have also been invited to send representatives.

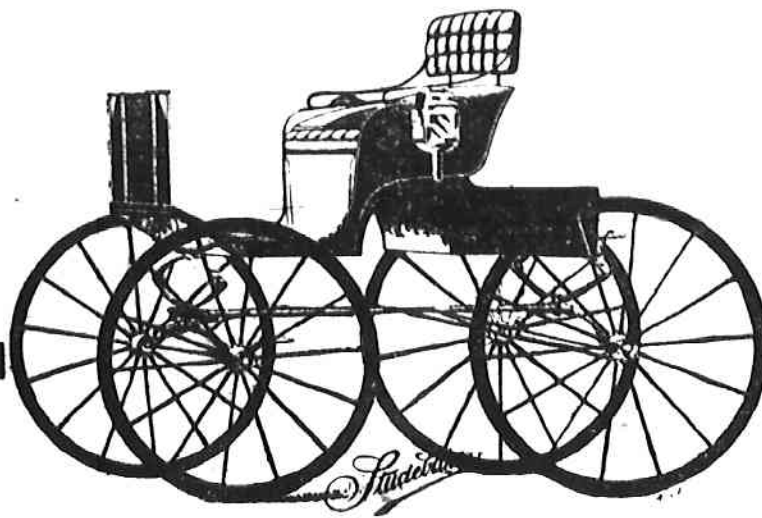
