The obstacle race scheduled for the event of today in the auto show week will be the most amusing and perhaps the most interesting feature of all. S. W. Elston, chairman of the obstacle race committee of the Indianapolis Automobile Trades Association, promises to equal the high standard set by the greatest hill climb and the biggest parade on record. By authority of the Board of Park Commissioners Capitol avenue, between Michigan and Vermont street, has been roped off and adequate police protection promised, so that the crowd can not in their enthusiasm interfere with the races. The event will be started at 10 o'clock.

Of the four events into which the obstacle race has been divided, the first will be for runabouts, the second for touring cars and the third will be an egg cracking contest for all cars. The fourth event is likewise an open contest, in which four or five cars at a time will endeavor to make the slowest speed on the high gear. No declutching will be permitted and each machine must be placed "in the high" and left there.

In the egg-cracking event the eggs will be placed against a two-by-four and the driver must drive over the post, barely crack the egg, and back away over the post.

Smashed Egg Costly.

If he smashes the egg or allows his wheel to touch the ground he is lost. Great difficulty and a large element of chance have been added to the obstacle race proper by placing several barrels apparently at an even distance apart. There is just enough difference, however, to make it impossible for the driver to pass between some of the barrels without knocking them down, and this he must avoid to win the event.

Frank Staley and W. W. Beeson are members of the committee in charge and S. W. Elston is the chairman.

The grand supper, smoker and general jollification of the Indianapolis Automobile Trades Association will be held at the Grand Hotel at 10:30 Saturday night. S. W.
