

AUTO MEN AGAIN DELAY BIG PARADE

Fearing Spectators Would Suffer From Wind, Show Committee Postpones Pageant.

WILLIS BARS DECORATIONS

In order to save the thousands of spectators from suffering the cold weather yesterday, the automobile show parade committee postponed that event until this afternoon. This change was a disappointment to all concerned. Hundreds of citizens lined Meridian street and waited for the pageant, which did not appear. As compensation for this unavoidable delay, the parade boosters are planning to improve the elaborate plans which were ready for the procession could it have been given Wednesday.

The weather man has proven false at the most critical moment, but indications are that he is repenting and that he will make up for the past "sins" and give such a splendid sample of spring weather this afternoon that will assure a successful parade.

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A special meeting of the parade committee was held yesterday afternoon in order to explain in full the rules which will govern this event. Chairman Fred Willis said he wanted the men to understand that he will be firm and will not tolerate decorations. He said he would have the police authorities keep all decorated cars from the procession. One placard, bearing only the car's name, model and agent's name will be permitted. This, it is said, will permit spectators to get the full benefit of the beautiful lines of the machines. Decorations would bury the fine points and injure the purpose of the event, according to the officers.

Willis also made clear the misunderstanding concerning the exact plans for formation and line of procedure. The police authorities and city officials will be lined on Meridian street. On Fall Creek boulevard between every square will be one section. On every cross street back from the boulevard will be stationed another section. Thus as the parade moves forward the divisions in the cross streets can fall in behind, thus avoiding any hitch in the uniformity of the procession. One point was overlooked by Willis when he first announced the line of procedure, and that is that the parade will move on Meridian street to Ohio. The merchants on Massachusetts avenue are as enthusiastic as ever over their intentions to decorate.

According to the present indications, the procession will meet the fondest expectations of the disappointed citizens and all will be more than repaid for their patient waiting. Most of the women who anticipated driving cars in the parade communicated with the managers yesterday and said that they could not enter because of the inclement weather. This was thought by the committee to be reason enough alone for delaying the event, as the women are expected to be prominent features of the procession.

Expects Big Banquet.

While the dealers are busy with the crowds of purchasers and the parade committee is battling with the weather man, the banquet committee is quietly planning large "doings" for the grand windup feast Saturday night. Hundreds of out-of-town auto devotees are expected to attend. Speeches by leading motor authorities will be delivered. Mayor Bookwalter will make an address on the benefits of such a show to the community. M. M. Crabill has consented to speak on good roadways ideas.
