All contests will be held on Capitol avenue, between Michigan and Walnut streets. Judges are F. M. Ayers, Charles Mayer and W. E. Hayward.

Today—Tire changing contest, three classes; Clincher, Quick detachable and Demountable rims, 2 o'clock. Women's egg race; course, one square and return at high gear with men drivers, 3 o'clock.

Wednesday—The grand parade. Starts at 2 o'clock from Fall Creek boulevard to Ohio street, west in Ohio street to Capitol avenue, south in Capitol avenue to Washington street, east in Washington street to East street, countermarch in Washington street to Pennsylvania street, north in Pennsylvania street to Massachusetts avenue, out Massachusetts avenue to the German House, where the parade will disband.

Following are the regulations which will govern every contest during the show:

In event of a dispute in the interpretation of the said rules, the decision of the contest committee shall be final, which committee reserves the right to alter or amend these rules as it may deem expedient until the morning of the contest.

"Entrants shall hold the Indianapolis Auto Trade Association, its officers and members, harmless and indemnify them against all losses or damage resulting directly or indirectly or growing out of the operation, management or control of the car entered by them from the time the car is handed over to the contest committee until delivered to them at the completion of the test. The Indianapolis Auto Trade Association will not be responsible for damages done to any car, accessory or contents, the car at all times being at the entrant's risk."
