LONG MOTORCYCLE RACE.

There has been a great deal of rivalry between Baker and Sink. They have met in a number of short races through Indiana and Ohio, with victory always on Baker's side. Sink thinks he can win in a long race. One-hundred-mile motorcycle races are a novelty in this section of the country, though they are common in the east. The race will be on a flat dirt track, and though the distance will not be anywhere near so far as would be possible on a banked track, the riders expect to approach the record for half-mile flat tracks, which is about a mile in 1:15.
