MILLIONS OF EYES WILL SEARCH FOR BALLOONS

RECORD FLIGHT TO BE STARTED IN THIS CITY JUNE 5.

HOPE TO SET NEW RECORD

Millions of eyes will be turned heavenward on June 5. And from that time for several days, hundreds of thousands of people will be searching the skies for the monster balloons that will be on their record flight from the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, where the Aero Club of America will hold its annual meet. It is hoped that the record established by the German balloon Pommern will be beaten for distance, while Carl G. Fisher has offered a special trophy for the balloon that remains in the air for the longest time.

Never before in the history of the sport have so many noted pilots gathered together to take part in a contest. Aeronauts from every part of the United States will take part in this great flight in which it is hoped that all records will be lowered.

A few of the most noted of the daring "Cowboys of the Sky" that will participate are A. Holland Forbes and his aid, Clifford B. Harmon. Mr. Forbes was the pilot of the ill-fated Conqueror two years ago which met with disaster in Berlin during the international flight for the world's trophy, when his balloon exploded, and but for his coolness and clever handling of the disabled craft, his life as well as that of his aid, Mr. Post, would have been sacrificed.

The aerodrome of the speedway is now well filled with the famous craft of the clouds, which will soon be turned loose from their moorings to start on their long flight through space, striving to win the trophy which carries with it the title of the champion of America for the season of 1909.
