### Cleveland Entry.

While Indianapolis, New York and St. Louis are receiving a great deal of attention with every prospect of carrying off the honors, Cleveland, the "Lake City," has a strong entry in Morgan and Wade.

The experience of this crew in making ascensions close to the border of Lake Erie will be useful in case the cloud racers pass near the Great Lakes, and at this time the northeasterly course, which will carry them over the lakes and into Canada, seems likely to be the one that most of them will select. Passing great bodies of water probably will prove more difficult to the Easterners and Southerners than to the crews of Cleveland, Indianapolis and Chicago.

Coe is not eligible to the great championship event as his balloon, the Chicago, which is the largest in the world, carries close to 120,000 cubic feet of gas. The limit for gas in the Aero Club of America contest is 80,000.

The consequence of this ruling has been to cause the Indiana Aero Club to put in a special event for all balloons which is called the Indiana Club handicap.

### Weight Handicap.

The balloons will be handicapped according to weight so that Coey will be forced to carry the heaviest load of ballast. A special cup for the handicap event has been provided and in the handicap there will be three starters.

This will be the first race on the program. The championship balloons, by starting one hour later, will fill during a cooler period, and in view of the contraction of gas, will be enabled to carry the limit of gas. The big Chicago when inflated will stand as high as a ten-story building.
