Longest foreign balloon trip in 1908 was made Oct. 12, by the Helretia, starting from Berlin in the James Gordon Bennett race. It remained suspended seventytwo hours and traveled 750 miles.

Longest flight up to 1908, 370 miles, from St. Louis to Henderson, N. Y., made in July, 1859, by John Wise, William Hyde and two companions. Time, 19 hours and 40 minutes. Wise was drowned in a subsequent flight.

Lahm's flight in 1906, 402 miles, from Paris to Robin Hood Bay, England.

Longest balloon flight ever made, 1,193 miles, from Paris to a point in the prov-ince of Kieff, Russia, made in 1900, by Count de la Vauix. Time, 36 hours and

45 minutes. First balloon sent up by Montgolfler brothers, in Auvergne, France, June 5.

First human being to ascend. Pilatre de Rozier, at Paris, Oct. 15, 1783.

First person killed in ballooning. M. de Rozier and M. Romaine, in trying to cross the English Channel, June 15, 1785.

Greatest height above sea level reached in balloon, 37,000 feet.
