NDIANA MUTOR CLUB WILL OPEN SEASON

Series of Motor and Canoe Races to Be Held at Broad Ripple Course Saturday.

LOCAL MEN ARE INTERESTED

Organization to Set Wheels at Work to Push Sport—Fine Prizes to Be Offered.

The Indiana Motor Club will open the season next Saturday afternoon at Broad Ripple with a program including canoe and motor boat races. The club is organized for the purpose of promoting sport of motor-powered machines, including contests between automobiles, as well as boats driven by electricity.

Although motor boat racing is rather a rare event in this State, 'nevertheless it is the intention of the club to push the sport, and from the success that has attended their efforts in the past they are confident that they will not work in vain.

In fact, the course at Broad Ripple is really one of the finest in the country, comparing favorably with any where motor boat racing is considered an important sport. The craft which will be entered next Saturday in the contests are high-powered boats, and some of them have entered in the struggles on the lakes and come out victorious.

Four Motor Boat Races.

The program next Saturday will consist of four canoe races and four motor boat races. The first contest will be called at 3 o clock sharp. The program is as fol-

CANOE RACES.

Quarter mile—One man, single paddle. Quarter mile—Two-men, single paddles. Quarter mile—Two men double paddles. Quarter mile free-for-all—Any number of men, any kind of paddles.

MOTOR RACES.

Five miles-First class, boats 30 feet long and over.

Four miles-Second class, boats 20 to 30

feet long.
Three miles—Third class, boats 18 to 20 Three miles—Third class, boats 18 to feet long.
Three miles—Fourth class, under 18 feet.

The leading boats that will contest are Highball, owned by G. A. Deitch; Eph, owned by Carl G. Fisher; Phantine II, owned by B. N. Pierce; Going, owned by J. D. Sullivan; Gone, owned by O. M.


