HIGH POWER MOTOR BOATS TO BE RACED

TEN-MILE EVENT TO BE FEATURE OF PROGRAM.

Racing Meet Under Auspices of Indiana Motor Club—Races for Canoes.

Owners of motor boats and canoes who have the racing enthusiasm will be given an opportunity to enter into the aquatic race events at Broad Ripple, Saturday afternoon, in the meet to be held under the auspices of the Indiana Motor club.

In all there will be eight events, the most important of which will be the ten-mile match race for high power motor boats. The program contains events for low-power motor boats, distance four miles, and events for canoes of one-fourth, one-half and one mile. All the events are open to all and there is no entrance fee.

In the ten-mile event there are four boats already entered. The boats are as follows: Eph, owned by Carl Fleher; Phantine II, owned by B. N. Pierce; Gono, owned by O. M. Bosart; San Toy, owned by G. A. Delfch. The events will start at 2:30. The start will be south of the club's home at Broad Ripple. The course will be a mile to the north. The club is especially anxious to get all the events filled, especially the canoe events.

LATONIA DERBY

PROVES BEST MUDDER IN DECISION FIELD OF SEVEN.

CINCINNATI, O., June 11.—The Abbott, carrying the blue polka dotted jacket of W. J. Young, the owner and trainer of Lexington, and ridden by J. Lee, staggered home first in the twenty-fifth Latonia derby yesterday five lengths in front of his nearest competitor, Redgauntlet. Beau Brummell was third. The other three horses that ran were scattered in Indian file, and Bottles, last of all, was just about straight in the stretch when the good son of The Friar passed under the wire. The time was 2:46 1-5.

The race was run under the most adverse conditions, and it was mighty wet under foot and for the greater part of the afternoon showers were in evidence.

The early morning rain made the track slow and the downpours, which began shortly before 2 p. m. and lasted until the Derby was almost over, made the track a sea of muddy water.

That did not bother The Abbott much, for he led every step of the way, and, though very tired at the end, he managed to win by a long streak of daylight. But once was he in danger, and that when Redgauntlet closed at the three-eighth pole and then it looked for a moment as if that other imp of darkness, D. Austin, would overhaul the leader. But if The Abbott was tired, Redgauntlet and the bunch behind him were in a worse fix. Jockey Lee held him together like a veteran and hunched him with his hands and heels, and his lead of five lengths was not cut down at the end. Not a spot of mud facked the blue jacket with the white polka dots, but the others were a sorrowful looking lot.
