## AUTOISTS TO REPAIR ROADS.

Promoters of Brier Cliff Race Deposit Money to Cover Damages to Course.

**ALBANY, N. Y., April 21.**—As a prerequisite to the granting of permission for the proposed Brier Cliff automobile race over public roads in West Chester County on Friday, State Engineer Sweeny has demanded that the promoters of the race deposit \$200 for each mile of the course to cover the cost of repair to any damage that may be done to the roads.

Whatever remains after the repairs have been made will be returned. It is expected that the managers of the race will be here today to make the deposit.

The first serious accident occurred today on the Brier Cliff course, over which the automobile race is to be run on Friday next. J. R. Ryal of Newark, N. J., had his left leg broken and Charles Murray received internal injuries.

Ryal, Murray, Charles Robertson and James Weed started early today to go over the course in a sixty-horse-power car. Ryal was driving at a sharp pace when the car struck the side of a bridge and went over into Sawmill River. The car overturned and the four men were in danger of drowning when another car, which had followed closely, arrived on the bridge. The driver called some men to his aid and they rescued the men from the stream.

Ryal and Murray were rushed to the East View Hospital. Weed and Robertson were not hurt. It was said that Ryal's leg was in a plaster cast when this accident happened. It was broken in an automobile accident at Atlantic City a short time ago.
