SIMPLEX CAR WINS IN EASTERN GRIND

Finishes First in Twenty-Four-Hour Automobile Race Marred by Fatal Accident.

LOCAL ENTRIES IN CONTEST

Marion and Cole Machines Remain on Brighton Beach Track Despite Accidents.

BRIGHTON BEACH, N. Y., May 14.—Charles Basle, driving a Simplex car, won the twenty-four-hour automobile race of the Motor Racing Association tonight, completing 1,145 miles. Ralph Mulford, driving a Stearns No. 1, finished second, twenty-five miles behind Basle, while Ralph De Palma, in a Fiat, was third, with 1,107 miles. The record for the time is 1,196 miles.

The Marion car, which was laid out twice by accidents, and the Cole car, which was almost wrecked when "Bill" Endicott and his mechanic were painfully injured, finished the race in seventh and ninth positions.

Ten of the twelve cars that originally started finished, but the race cost the life of one man, the serious injury of a second and minor hurts to two others. William F. Bradley, mechanic for Lewis Strang, sustained injuries that caused his death during the early hours of the race, when the Marion, driven temporarily by Hubert
