"Automobile owners are complaining to a realization of the fact that a heavy motor car is not the profitable one for their use," is the statement made by H. H. Franklin, head of the company which makes the Franklin automobiles. "Such vehicles mean great waste of power. Their first work must always be the carrying of their own excess weight, an increased percentage of power being used in the moving of the car itself and a smaller relative amount in the actual transportation of passengers or other load. Therefore, it is the lightweight motorcar which to the greatest extent makes its power do the work for which it was intended."

AUTO SUPPLANTS RUNNERS.

Old Brighton Beach Track Converted Into Motor Course.

NEW YORK, July 10.—The old Brighton Beach race track has been leased by the Motor Racing Association, who will convert it into a motor course and hold a series of tournaments. The first meeting will be held on July 30 and 31, when a twenty-four-hour race for European and American stock cars will be held, preceded by a number of shorter races. This will assure the preservation of the famous track for sporting events. It was proposed to cut the property up into building lots.

Pleasant Automobile Trip.

NEW YORK, July 10.—The party which left the Illinois Athletic Club, Chicago, on June 22 in two automobiles has arrived here after a remarkably pleasant trip. Carl J. Stein was the head of the party. He was accompanied by his wife, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Moler and Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Bohn. Deducting a four days' stay at Detroit and three days at Toronto, with a side trip to Saratoga, they rode the 1,567 miles in nine days. Some days they made more than 200 miles. The farther east they came the better they found the roads. After a week in New York they will return to Chicago in the same machine.
