BUMBAUGH FORSAKES HIS OVERLAND BALLOON TRIP

Aeronaut Writes That He Is Coming From Los Angeles by Rail.

G. L. Bumbaugh, the aeronaut who is to assist members of the Aero Club of Indiana in their preparations for the balloon race this spring, is expected to arrive in Indianapolis from Los Angeles tomorrow or Friday. Bumbaugh sent a letter to Dr. Goethe Link, one of the enthusiastic local aeronauts, saying that the proposed balloon trip from Los Angeles to Indianapolis has been abandoned on account of weather conditions. Bumbaugh said he would be compelled to make the trip by rail. Dr. Link says that everything is in readiness for the ascensions which are to be made by Indianapolis aeronauts under Bumbaugh's guidance. Two members of the club have balloons already fitted out and are only waiting for warmer weather to begin their ascensions. A movement is also being pushed for the purchase of a balloon to be owned by the club and entered into the coming race.
