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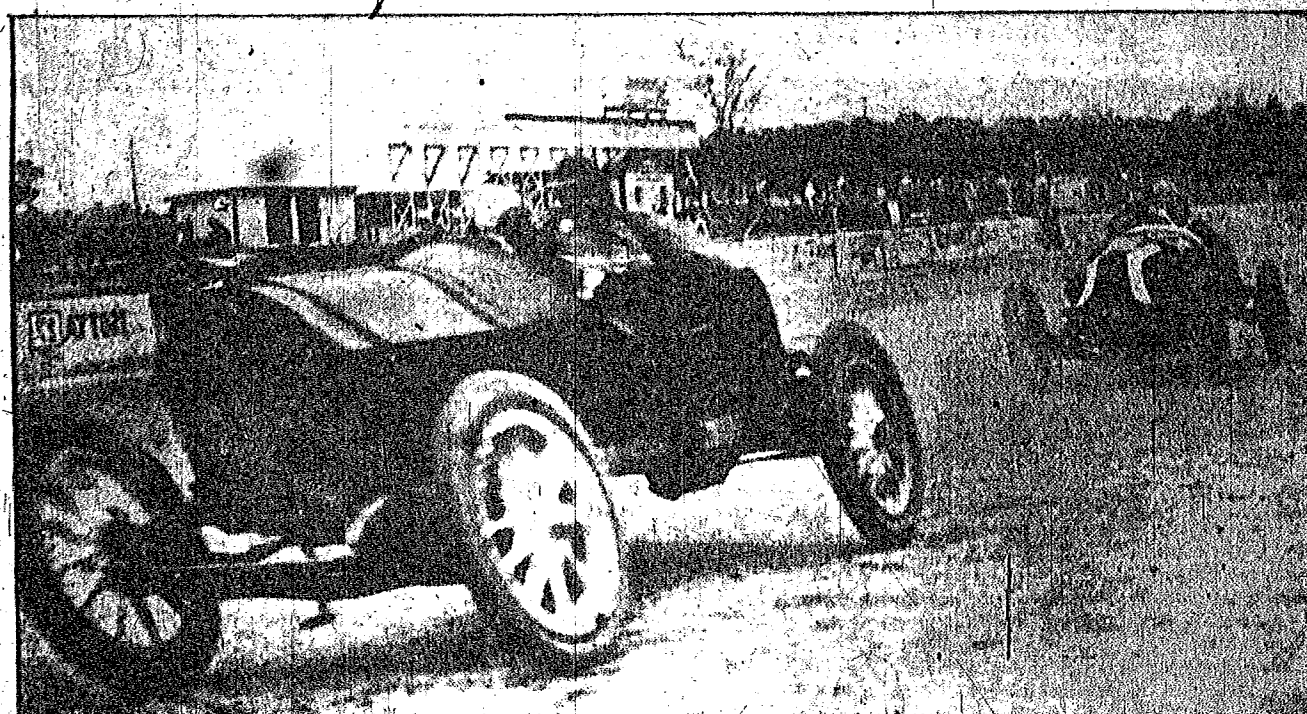

EARLY BRUSH AT SPEEDWAY

For the first time this year, a number of exciting brushes featured the practice work at the speedway yesterday. Burman, Herr and Merz vied with each other in getting speed out of their mounts, seeing back and forth on the turns and straightaways. The above photograph was caught at the head of the stretch, just as Burman came spurring up to pass Herr. The speed king's Keeton car is easily distinguishable because of its sloping hood and general French appearance. Bob's time for this particular lap was 1:45, a sensational performance when the fact that it was only his second appearance on the track is taken into consideration. He expects to cut his final average down to a much lower figure than that, constantly tuning up his car with that purpose in view. Hardly a night passes that he does not thoroughly overhaul his mount, slightly altering this thing and that, according to experience derived from his practice spins, with the result that he is getting more and more speed every day. The Stutz team is remarkable for the evenness and consistency of its showing. All three of the cars run well, reeling off mile after mile with apparently no sign of breakdown or fatigue. Anybody who beats this aggregation, with the weeks of preliminary work and preparation it has gone through, will certainly have to go some.
