around every headquarters as the manu-
facturers do not want to entirely lose
sight of the commercial end of the show.
Whether a visitor looks like a \$3,000 pur-
chaser or just a common rubber, he is
given the best of attention by the smooth-
tongued and optimistic agents. Many of
the "country agents" are arriving daily,
bringing parties of prospective customers
with them to see the sights.

One of the four central positions upon
the main floor of the Coliseum is occupied
by the Premier Company of Indianapolis.
Its neighbors are the Pierce, Haynes,
Studebaker, Chalmers-Detroit and the
Thomas, so that it becomes a prominent
figure among some of the largest auto-
mobile factories of the country. Recogn-
ition of this fact was one reason why
the Premier Company was able to secure
what was considered to be one of the
best positions in the entire exhibition.

Closes \$4,000,000 Contract.

More remarkable than even the wonder-
ful story of the meteoric rise of the
Willys-Overland automobile plant is the
way that propositions involving millions
of dollars and thousands of automobiles
are handled by the men who are con-
cerned in the Indianapolis factory. It re-
mained for a representative of this com-
pany handling cars in St. Louis and
Texas to make the biggest announce-
ment of the national show as an incident
in a five-minute talk to the gathering of
Overland agents.

"I have just closed with President John
N. Willys a contract to take 3,500 Over-
land and Marlon machines for my terri-
tory, the total value of the contract being
approximately \$4,000,000; watch results
in the great rich region west of the Mis-
sissippi River," said Jerome Harrington,
St. Louis and Dallas agent of the Over-
land, in a matter-of-fact way.

"Where will the Willys spirit for ex-
