On this anniversary Dan O'Leary will celebrate his seventy-seventh birthday anniversary and will start on the job of walking four miles an hour for twenty-four hours on June 29.

Dan has one great auxiliary in this effort. As he says himself he does not depend upon his sole (the good Lord will take care of that) but he does depend somewhat on his heel.
