Sernational Sweepstakes to 🖟 Be Run Sunday, July 28.

For the first time in the history of automobile racing the fastest drivers in the world are going to race for their money. This is the announcement the today by Manager Charles H Portification of the Chicago speedway. The race will be held there on Sunday, July 28 and will be known as the international spreepstakes. It will have a value of \$55,000. under the conditions of the race the

under the conditions of the race the finatest drivers will be invited to complete, only those known to have core capable of making more than 105 sailes per hour being invited. Each driver will have to put up \$2,000 and the speedway will add enough to bring the total to \$35,000.


