HUNDREDS SEE THE BOY SCOUT BICYCLE RACES

Five thousand people witnessed the races held at the Spencer park race track yesterday. The races were given under the direction of the Boy Scout executive board of this city, and were more than a success. There were 23 entries in the races, all of whom were Boy Scouts of the various troops of Logansport.

At 2:30 sharp Scout Executive Miller ordered the judges for the races to their stand and the first race was announced, and after the sound of the pistol they were off. The first race was for boys under 12 years of age with common road bicycles. Distance one-half mile. Winners were Dalton Minnick of Troop No. 1, first prize, pair of Rex Tough Tread tires; David Riggs of Troop No. 4, second prize, a trip cyclometer; Harold Wright of Troop No. 1, third prize, frame pump. Winners' time was one minute and 28 seconds.

The racers for the second race were then called to the track and the race started, this time for a mile. Pumping against the wind seemed to have no effect on the boys, and all came close together at the end. Winner of first prize was Joe Gremelspacher of Troop No. 1, time 2:29 1-5. Cloy Anderson of Troop No. 2 won second prize, a leather racing saddle; Jason Birkenruth of Troop No. 6 won third prize, a luggage carrier.

Everyone seemed more interested and the crowd had grown so that the Scouts were called upon to keep the spectators from the race track. The third race was announced and they were off. Around they went and everything going fine until several of the racers ran into each other on the opposite side of the race track, and after William Lewis of Troop No. 4, gathered himself together, off he started again and putting all his strength into the race, finished first place, and won the gold watch. His time was 3:12. Henry Hoppman of Troop No. 1, came in second and won a pair of U. S. Bike tires; Charles Grant of Troop No. 4, came in close and won third prize, a bicycle horn.

Owing to the fact that so many of the Scouts that just finished the race for motor-bike riders only, were signed up for the free-for-all race which was to be the next race on the program there was an intermission of about five minutes. After this short intermission, Miller called time and ordered the track to be cleared and the racers to take their places. The sound of "ready judges," and "ready racers," was clearly heard, then "on your mark, get set—Bang," they were off. First one to start, then Glen Vance of Troop No. 1 took the lead. He was able to pass him until he had passed the line and won first place, a silver loving cup being given for first prize and was none too good for a Scout who could lead a race like that. Joe Gremelspacher won second prize and was given a pair of Fisk bike tires, this being the second pair of tires that Scout Gremelspacher won during the afternoon. Clyde Allen of Troop No. 6 won third prize, a pair of racing pedals. The winner's time was 3:02.

This was the last race on the program but the crowd cheered so that Mr. Martin, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 6, offered three cash prizes for the best three riders of the Scouts in his troop; so the track was cleared and off they started, Carl Shaver winning first, Harry Birkenruth, second, and Armine Budde finishing third. After this race Mr. Arnold of the Arnold Motor Co., offered a cash prize so the riders of Troop No. 1, took him up on the proposition and all rode a fast half mile. Fred Harrell won first, Glen Vance, second, and Henry Hoppman, came in third place.

The judges for the various races were: Mr. Martin, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 6, Mr. Lynas, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 5, and Mr. Arnold of the Arnold Motor Co. The Miller-Thruston Bicycle Co. were also a great help to Mr. Miller. The prizes for the various races were given away in front of the grand stand and loud cheers arose after the awarding of each prize. Mr. Miller, Scout executive of this city, stated to the crowd that there would probably be more races of this kind in the city within a short time, and all seemed well pleased to hear this news.

It might be well to state that there were 23 entries for the races. This is just one of the various stunts the Boy Scouts of this city have promoted. It's a good movement, and if you haven't given it any consideration, now is the time. Get behind them!

DE PALMA WINS HANDICAP RACE AT CINCINNATI

Speedway Cincinnati, July 4.—Ralph De Palma won the 100 mile liberty handicap automobile race at the Sharonville speedway here today by finishing almost a full lap of the two mile course ahead of Tom Milton. The latter had only a small margin over Ralph Mulford, while Barney Oldfield was a half mile behind, but landed in fourth place.
De Palma drove a consistent race and was favored by not having to stop during the entire race. He assumed the lead at the thirty-fifth mile and thereafter was never headed. Hickey after repeated trouble with his engine came in fifth and Louis Chevrolet, who was a favorite previous to the race, was forced to the pits three times with tires, but finished well up and obtained sixth place. Others who finished were Vail, Fred McCarthy, Andy Burt, A. E. Cotey and Omar Toft.

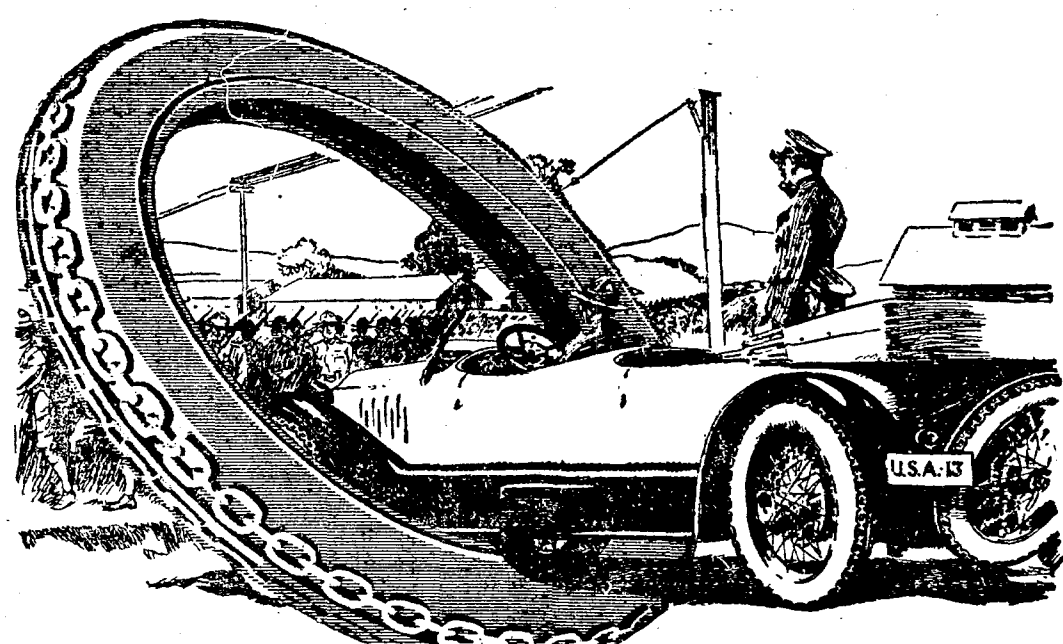

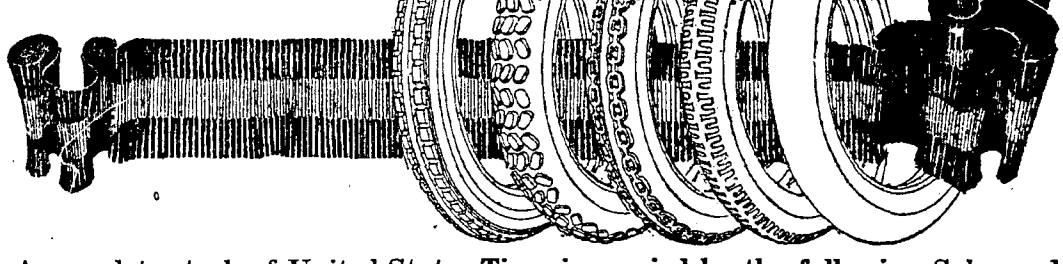

HUGE WHALE CAPTURED IN THE THAMES RIVER

SEA MONSTER TIPPED SCALES AT HALF A TON; MAY BE GIVEN TO ROYAL FAMILY.
London, July 4.—The capture of a real whale eighteen feet long and weighing half a ton, in the River Thames just above the Parliament buildings, constitutes something new in London riverside history.
Splashing and floundering in shallow water about 100 yards from the Battersea bridge, the young whale quickly attracted attention. It had failed to take advantage of the ebb tide and was trapped on the foreshore. It was killed with a boat hook and a small party of boatmen raised it by means of a crane to a wharf where it was measured and weighed.
Under a strict interpretation of the British law, the whale might have been commandeered by the authorities as the property of the crown. Any whale captured in British waters constitutes a royal perquisite. The tail, according to law, would belong to Queen Mary and the head to King George. It is generally believed that this partition was originally decided upon an order that the queen should always have a stock of whalebone, but the founder of this act of courtesy made the error of giving her the wrong half.
The sturgeon also can be claimed as a royal perquisite, and this right has been exercised in recent times. A sturgeon caught in the Thames was served at Queen Victoria's wedding banquet, and a few years ago a Welshman who captured one in a Welsh harbor complied with the dictates of loyalty by sending it to King George.

Norfolk, Va., July 4.—David Robertson, former star outfielder of the New York Nationals, announced today that he had refused the offer of \$7,500 a year salary to rejoin the Giants. He will remain in the government service here.
