

CLEMENS WILL DRIVE

ENTERED IN 100-MILE RACE

Local Driver to Compete With Oldfield and Other Professionals —Ellis to Make Debut.

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C. A. Coey, the crack Chicago driver, and Jerry Ellis, the amateur champion, will both be in the 100-mile race, and a wire received by Racing Secretary Frank Moore last night contained the information that Will Muir, the young millionaire from Lexington, Ky., will be here this morning with a big Pope-Toledo machine for the races. Muir was defeated by Oldfield in the fifty-mile race in Lexington last week and has declared that he will follow the champion all over the country until he scores a win over him. Muir was the American representative in the Gordon Bennett race in France last summer.

In the Hoosier State Sweepstakes, the \$1,000 race, the entries up to last night were Barney Oldfield and his Green Dragon; Paul Kaiser, the German, and his White Streak; C. A. Coey and his Thomas Tornado, and Jerry Ellis and his Frayer-Miller.

There is a bitter rivalry existing between Coey and Oldfield, its origin dating from the Chicago meet last season, Coey claiming that Oldfield crowded him in the finish of the big open race, causing him to shut off power to keep from running into the fence. Carl Fisher was in the same race, winning the second heat from Chevrolet, the French champion. Kaiser, the German, is a quiet, unassuming fellow off the track, but drives with an air of reckless abandon on the track. As a circular track pilot Kaiser has no equal among the foreigners.

Jerry Ellis is to make his professional debut in tomorrow's races. The amateur championship was won by him during the Morris Park meeting in New York last July, and it is with the hope of beating Oldfield and some of the other professionals that Ellis is turning to the professional class.

MANAGER CARR GETS MARCAN.

Manager Carr of the Indianapolis team has closed a deal with the St. Paul Club for Lilly Marcan, the popular little shortstop of the Saints, who has been relegated to the background since the signing of Rockensfield by Manager Padden. Marcan is slated to join the Hoosiers for the games here on Wednesday with the Toledo Club.

Marcan, it is thought, will greatly strengthen the Indianapolis infield and he will no doubt be played at second base. He is a good fielder and a fair hitter.
