STUTZ BENDS AXLE OF CAR

Machinist Is Thrown Out on Curve, but Escapes Uninjured on Speedway.

CROWNPOINT, Ind., June 16.-Monsen and Stutz, driving two Marion automobiles, which are to compete "Western Vanderbilt" June 18-19, fyrnished a real racing incident in practice over the Crownpoint-Lowell course today.

Monsen and Stutz, having left grand stand a few miles behind, found themselves in a close race in the double curve known as the "S."
