Report of Auto Scouting Party is Highly  
 Complimentary to Roadways

CHICAGO, March 14.—Renewed enthusiasm  
 over the prospects for the first running of  
 the national stock chassis race for the Cobe  
 Trophy was kindled today by the scouting  
 expedition to the Indiana circuit. Four cars
