Having handly weathered every adverse gust, the contests committee of the Chicago Automobile Club sees nothing but clear sailing ahead for the first Western Stock Chassis Race for the Cobe trophy and the small car event for the Chicago Automobile Club cup, to be held in Lake County, Indiana, June. 18 and 19.

Sanction granted, cylinder and weight classification agreed upon, concessions secured as to "stock" specifications and militia protection of the most efficient and adequate character assured, the Chicagoans feel that their event will not alone mark an important advance in Western motoring sport, but will likewise set new records in the national calendar.

Under no more favorable auspices has any motor contest of great magnitude been undertaken in this country. Frank B.
