NO MORE AUTO RACES ON DAYTONA BEACH COURSE

EXPENSE TOO BIG FOR SMALL TOWN TO DEFRAY.

NO HELP FROM RAILROADS

NEW YORK, December 20.—Senator W.
J. Morgan announces that the famous Or-
mond-Daytona beach races in Florida will
not be held next spring, and it is also
stated on good authority that Savannah
will make no attempt to hold an interna-
tional race.

The senator says that, while all the
world's automobile records from one hun-
dred to three hundred miles, with the ex-
ception of the kilometer record, were
made at Ormond Beach, and he would
like to see another race there, the ex-
pense is too great to saddle on a small
town like Daytona without any help from
the railroads and steamship companies,
who have not contributed a dollar, al-
though they derived the greatest profits
from these events. Then, too, the Florida
East Coast Automobile Association, which
has raised something like \$50,000 during
the last seven years for the promotion of
the races, is a unit in the belief that it
has gone far enough, and the board has
declined to have anything more to do
with the financing of the project.
