Frank Moore entered the Stoddard-Dayton, this morning, and hopes to throw dust in the faces of many of the other entries. This is the machine with which Moore won second position in the hill climb. Barney Oldfield will unload his Green Dragon this afternoon, and the famous car will be towed to a local garage. The Green Dragon can not be run in the streets under its own power, owing to the exhausts not being muffled and because the machine has but one speed. The great racing car can not be throttled lower than forty miles an hour and when in action the exhausts resemble a battery of Gatling guns in action.

Oldfield will attempt to lower his world's record during the races Wednesday. It was at the State Fair Grounds that Oldfield startled the world by fulfilling his promise to drive a mile in less than a minute on a circular track. A number of out-of-town enthusiasts will attend the races, and Elmer Apperson, of Kokomo, probably will have a car in the \$1,000 race. In the motorcycle race more than twenty entries have been received by racing Secretary Frank Moore.
