DE PALMA HERO OF TRACK BRITT LOSES

WINS 50-MILE FREE-FOR-ALL

DRIVER OF FIAT CYCLONE ALSO TAKES TEN-MILE HANDICAP, FINISHING EIGHTH OF MILE AHEAD OF MRS. CUNEO.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 22.—The last day of the Mardi Gras automobile races at the Fair Grounds mile track, furnished some live and exciting sport. The features were the ten-mile handicap and the fifty-mile free-for-all, both of which were won by Ralph De Palma in his Fiat Cyclone car.

The fifty-mile race was changed from a stock car event to a free-for-all in order that De Palma might enter with his Fiat.

The best sport of the afternoon was furnished by the ten-mile handicap free-for-all. There were five entries. De Palma was started at scratch, Robertson was given forty-five seconds and Mrs. Cuneo, Strange and Burman each given fifty seconds.

De Palma finished about an eighth of a mile in front of Mrs. Cuneo. Summaries:

LONDON, Feb. 22.—Jimmy Britt, the English pugilist, tonight won the decision over Jimmy Braddock in a twenty-round bout. The fight was held before the National Sporting Club. A big crowd was present and showed great interest in the bout. It was a lively fight these two men fought on the 21st of the month. On that occasion Britt won a ten-round affair and Braddock got the points. Tonight Summers got the points.

Both Summers and Braddock were hard for this meeting and in better condition than when they fought.
