
FRANKLIN NINE DEFEATS B. L. C. TEAM, 6 TO 4

"Yank" Sullivan, Former Referee, to Write Story of Michaels and Brady Scrap for The Herald

JEREMIAH P. "Yank" Sullivan, one of the oldest and ablest boxing referees in this country, will write for The Herald next Thursday the story of the boxing bout between "Young" Michaels and Ralph Brady for the light-weight championship of the city at the Arena on Wednesday night.

Just fifty-three years ago this summer "Yank" refereed his first boxing bout and he continued officiating up to within a few years ago. Old "Yank" has not missed a show in Syracuse in many years and his judgment is considered excellent by the fistie fans.

Mr. Sullivan has given more decisions at the end of bouts than any other up-state man and no boxing fan can afford to miss his story of the bout between the two local boys for the light-weight title of Central New York.

RECORD CROWD EXPECTED AT BOUT WEDNESDAY

Great Interest in Second Clash Between Michaels and Brady.

The most important boxing match to be staged up-state in many months will be on the list of fare for the fistie fans of Central New York next Wednesday night at the Arena when "Young" Michaels and Ralph Brady, the two leading 132-pound boys of Syracuse meet for the light-weight championship of this section.

It will be the second meeting of these two youngsters in less than two weeks and this clash was arranged by Match-maker Joe Dunfee of the Syracuse City. Because after their scrap last Monday night was so sensational and so close that the boxing fans of the city are divided in their opinions as to which boy was the winner.

Both boxers think that they were robbed by the newspapers. Brady being of the opinion that he should have earned the decision of all three judges. Michaels thinks that the sport writers were unfair to him in giving him the verdict. As a result each lad will to his utmost to be on the winning end of the mill when they clash Monday night.

Because of so much interest in the mill it is expected that the attendance record for a boxing bout in Syracuse will be shattered. The present mark attended the Sam Langford-Sam McVey bout several years ago. Last week about 2,400 persons saw Brady and Michaels box but this figure will surely be beaten Wednesday night.

Both boxers are working daily for the encounter. Brady is going through his stunts with Maxie Turner and several other clever boxers at Billy Grupp's gymnasium in New York city, while Michaels is training here with Jimmy Turner and several other local boys.

For the first time in the history of boxing in this city, spectators will have a chance to express their opinions after the bout Wednesday, for on each side is a stub on which the man can write who he thinks is the winner. These stubs will be dropped into boxes as the spectators leave the hall and the collector of the stubs will be announced in the papers the following day.

The preliminary bouts were announced last night by Joe Dunfee and the prelims will be seen a number of new faces. There will be no six-round bouts as in the past. The bouts will be three rounds long. The battles follow: Joe Bennett vs. Frankie Miller, featherweights; Joe Brown vs. Joe Moran, welterweights; "Batting" Barry and Bobby Tender, bantamweights; "Tango" Coxworth, Light Guy Gallo, California, weights; Danny Gardner vs. Bobby Hill, welterweights.

AMERICAN ARMY CREW READY TO RACE

Ralph De Palma, Auto Driver Who Smashed Record

DE PALMA WINS BIG AUTO RACE IN RECORD TIME

Covers Distance in 26 Minutes, 23-10 Seconds; Lewis Is Second.

DRIVERS AND CARS IN BIG AUTO RACE.

New York, June 14.—Ralph De Palma, taking the lead in the thirteenth mile of a 50-mile international auto race at the Sheepshead Bay track today, broke all world records for fifty miles, winning by a margin of a third of a lap in 26 minutes 23-10 seconds.

The previous record for the distance was 26 minutes, 52-10 seconds, made by Louis Chevrolet over the same track on September 1, 1917. De Palma alternated in second and third positions with Ralph Mulford leading for the first twelve miles, but on the next lap shot to the front and never was headed. He crossed the finish line two-thirds of a mile ahead of Dave Lewis and Joe Boyer, who finished second and third, only a few feet apart.

At 20 miles De Palma's time was 15 minutes, 22-10 seconds, and at 30 miles his time was 23-10 seconds. At 40 miles he was 35-10 seconds and at 50 miles he was 52-10 seconds. De Palma's time was 15-14-5 minutes an hour.

The timers and scorers did not announce what they considered De Palma made for intermediate distances, but it will be announced officially early next week.

Dario Resta had engine trouble at the start and quit the race on the first lap. Ira Vall retired for a similar cause in the fourth. The four races, two at ten miles each, the other two at 20 miles each, made up the program. Mulford won the 20 and one of the 10-mile races. The other results of the 50-mile event were: Thomas Milton, first; Mulford, second; Resta, third; Lewis, fourth. The time of the previous race, for forty miles, was 1:23-4-10 and his average speed for the fifty miles was 114-5 miles an hour.

The match was arranged yesterday afternoon.

De Palma's mastery driving and the condition of his car, constructed by the factory, held him in reserve in the three preceding events. After waging a fierce battle for the first 11 miles of the race, De Palma forged to the front when Mulford retired with a flat tire and was never headed.

The match was ideal for racing and the crowd was an enthusiastic one. Two other records also were smashed during the race. The first record, for 10 miles, was 1:23-4-10, also established by De Palma one year ago.

De Palma, 10 miles—Mulford, 1:23-4-10; Lewis, 1:24-2-10; Lewis, fourth. Time—5:42.2.

At least half of the anglers will receive prizes for their work, for more than fifty valuable prizes will be given to those fishermen who make catches of large mouth bass, small mouth bass, pike, pickerel, perch, brook trout, brown trout, lake trout and rock bass.

The outing of the Anglers association each summer is one of the feature events for the fishermen and there is always a good percentage of the members out on the streams and lakes.
