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DE PALMA ESTABLISHED 2 NEW WORLD'S RECORDS

LAST WEEK'S OUTPUT LARGEST OF COAL YEAR

CHICAGO, July 28.—Ralph De Palma was the principal performer in the program of sprint automobile events held this afternoon on the Chicago speedway. In addition to winning three of the four races, the Brooklyn driver established two new world's records in competition. He drove the victory in the ten-mile race in 5:24.5, lowering the former mark, 5:33.01, held by Dario Resta, and averaged 109.24 miles per hour.

In the twenty-mile dash Palma easily won, his time being 10:50.25. The old mark was set by De Palma at 10:53.8. His average for the distance today was 110.51 miles per hour.

De Palma also annexed the thirty-mile race, his time being 16:54.45, an average of 106.51 miles per hour.

Dario Resta won the opening event at two miles in 1:18. Louis Chevrolet was second and De Palma third.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Production of bituminous coal during the week ended July 20 amounted to 12,950,000 net tons, the largest weekly production of the coal year with one exception, the fuel administration today announced.

The amount mined during the week was 15.3 per cent. greater than the tonnage produced during the corresponding week of 1917.

The production for the coal year, however, is 3,912,500 tons behind the requirements set by the fuel administration.
