DE PALMA ESTABLISHED
2 NEW WORLD'S RECORDSLAST WEEK'S OUTPUT
LARGEST OF COAL YEAR

CHICAGO, July 28.—Ralph De Palma was the principal performer in the program of sprint automobile events held this afternoon on the Chicago speedway. In addition to winning three of the four races, the Brooklyn driver established two new world's records in competition.

He drove the victory in the ten-mile race in 5:24.45, lowering the former mark, 5:33.01, held by Dario Resta, and averaged 109.24 miles per hour.


In the twenty-mile dash Palma easily won, his time being 10:50.25. The old mark was set by De Palma at 10:53.8. His average for the distance today was 110.51 miles per hour.

De Palma also annexed the thirty-mile race, his time being 16.54.45, an average of 106.51 miles per hour.

Dario Resta won the opening event at two miles in 1:18. Louis Chevrollet was second and De Palma third.

LEAGUE LEADERS LOST
GROUND LAST WEEK

NEW YORK, July 28.—The leading team in each of the major leagues lost ground last week. The Chicago Nationals broke even in six games while New York in second place, won five of its seven games. The Boston Americans won three and lost two but Cleveland and Washington, second and third respectively, lost none of their games; the Indians winning three and the Senators five. Washington lost to St. Louis today after winning seven straight games.

In the National league Chicago lost last Sunday to Brooklyn, making it four straight for the Superbas. Parker's home run beat Philadelphia Wednesday and heavy batting marked Thursday's double-header, which was divided. Vaughn beat Boston Saturday.

New York gained upon the Cubs by taking five games out of six from St. Louis, twice capturing doubleheaders. Pittsburgh defeated New York Saturday.

Pittsburgh won from Boston Monday and then dropped three out of four to Brooklyn. In the first game Thursday Grimes allowed the Pirates one hit. Cincinnati batted the ball hard but won only five of its nine games. Brooklyn and St. Louis broke even in a double-header Saturday, the Cardinals making twenty-two runs and twenty-six hits in the second game, both season records.
