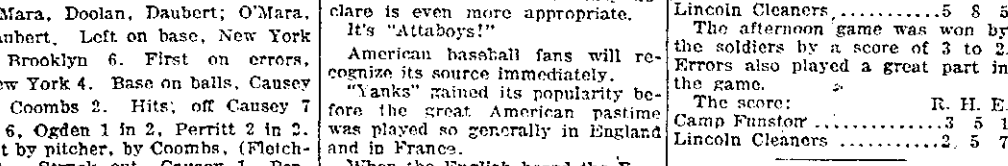
C. M. & S. P. HEAD DIES IN PRIVATE CAR
