# BOWLERS ARE READY AUTO DEALERS BUSY

## SEASON IN FULL BLAST SOON

### Commercial League to Open Com- ing Year Next Tuesday Night —No New Leagues.

The bowling season for the winter of 1906-1907 will open next Tuesday night when the members of the Commercial League take their first whirl at the pins. A new set of alleys will be used this season by the leagues, owing to the Marion alleys being put out of business for a while by the rebuilding of the clubhouse. The new alleys are the Pastime's.

The disuse of the Marion alleys has caused much trouble to the various leagues' alley committee, and the Commercial, by starting early, got around the difficulty nicely. They will use the Turner's, Columbia's and Pastime's. On the opening night the Marotts will meet the American Nationals and the Kingan and Water Company teams will roll against each other on the Turner alleys. The Brown-Ketchams will battle with the Fletchers at the Pastime alleys and the Lilly & Stainakers are scheduled to roll the Liebers and the Indiana Nationals are to meet the Capital Nationals at the Columbia alleys.

Last season was the greatest in the history of local bowling and the Indianapolis enthusiasts are expecting the success of the coming year to eclipse that of last year. All the alleys will be in use every night again, with the exception of Saturday night. All the teams have been strengthened and a new standard for extraordinary high scores is promised to be set early in the season.

The new five-men eight-club league that was projected a few weeks ago and which looked to be a strong organization has fallen before its completion. The main reason was because one team including five of the premier pin knights of the city was gotten up, which the other members of the proposed organization knew would never lose a game.

## 1907 MODELS ARE ARRIVING

### New Styles Being Tested—Many Tourists Passing Through the City—Local Gossip.

The local automobile dealers are well pleased with the business that they are doing at the present, for it is the heaviest for the time of the year in the auto history of the city. Indianapolis is becoming well known as an auto city on account of its numerous machine owners and factories and dealers. Its location, being the center of an excellent system of public roads, has done much toward giving it the name. Many touring parties, in all kinds of machines, have passed through the city in the last few days. A greater part of them were from Chicago.

The enthusiasts at the Windy City are becoming more and more pleased with the highways of Hoosierdom, and a trip through the southern part of the State, to Cincinnati and into Kentucky, is becoming very popular. Mr. C. E. Beckel, a director in the Accessory and Automobile Parts Exposition, which is to be held at the Coliseum in Chicago Sept. 22-23, was in the city recently, combining a pleasure trip with business. He went to Cincinnati and also came back through Indianapolis. He pronounced the roads between the Windy City and Porkopolis to be as good as any he had met with any place.

Several local companies which make automobile supplies have entered their goods in the Chicago show. Some of the local manufacturers who will compete there are the Schebler-Carbuter Company, Diamond Chain Works, Pyle Manufacturing Company, G. & J. Tire Company, Prest-O-Lite Company and others.

Mr. Fred Ayres and party, including F. C. Bobbs and their wives, returned by rail after an extensive trip through the East to Boston.
