WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—With descriptions interesting in the army and navy and entertainments falling off, the two branches of the United States services have been put to the legal limit of their strength. The prospect of going on the Pacific cruise has been a strong argument with the enlisting officer, and the Navy Department is using it freely in persuading young men to enlist. In fact, in recent years the number of the two departments have changed radically.

Today the department gets out illustrated booklets filled with half-tone illustrations and pictures in colors showing the delights of life on a shipboard and the pleasures of travel which are open to the world.

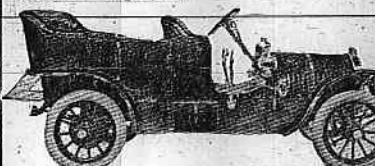

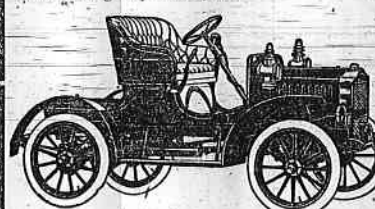

LEGAL BATTLE IS PROMISED

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Nov. 21.—That a united effort will be made by some of the prominent attorneys of Oklahoma, the new state recently admitted to the Union, to enjoin the attorney general and the state and county officials from enforcing the prohibition clause of the State's Constitution, is now an assured fact.

Col. Lee F. Wilson, formerly an attorney of this city, but who went to Oklahoma two months ago, has been engaged to take charge of the fight by the anti-Prohibitionists of the state. WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—With decorations increasing in the army and navy and enlistments falling off, the navy has found it hard to obtain recruits and today the little converted yacht Wasp is on its way up the Hudson River, equipped at every little town from Sandara in the head of navigation, offering young men the chance to enlist and expanding the advantages of enlistment. The first town visited was West Point, where the Wasp was met with very enthusiastic reception. It is not difficult to see why. Many youths are attracted by her name and many parents are out of employment. The little steam launch which waits at the shore for recruiting material is quickly filled and soon lands the load on the deck of the Wasp. There the candidates are questioned and if they answer the questions satisfactorily, they are sent down to the surgeon. Here the physical examination is made and if the candidate is found to be in good health, he is recruited and sent to the nearest station.

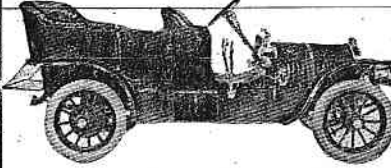

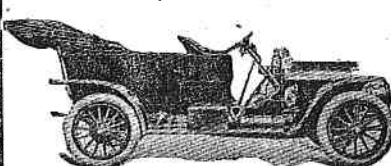

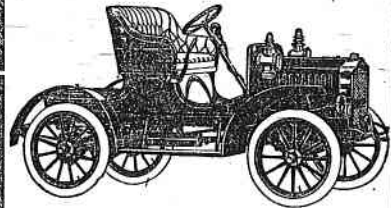

LAWYER PLANS WAR ON PROHIBITION LAW

Indiana Attorney Employed to Fight Clause in Constitution of New State.

LEGAL BATTLE IS PROMISED

Both Sides Ready to Fight for Supremacy in Oklahoma Struggle.

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Nov. 30.—That a united effort will be made by some of the prominent attorneys of Oklahoma, the new state recently admitted to the Union, to enjoin the attorney general and the state and county officials from enforcing the prohibition clause of the state's Constitution, is now an assured fact.

Col. Lee F. Wilson, formerly an attorney of this city, but who went to Oklahoma two months ago, has been engaged to take charge of the fight by the anti-prohibitionists of the state. Mr. Wilson receives as his fee \$25,000, 10 per cent of which has already been deposited in a bank to his credit. He will be assisted by some of the best legal talent in the new state, among whom are his brother, E. W. Wilson, formerly of Denver, Colo.

The Rev. Attorney Dinsdale, Attorney General West, E. K. Reardon, county attorney, and a host of others have been engaged and will assist the state. A battle royal will be waged on the functions of the framers of the organic law.
