Now, I've had my say; fire in your
questions.

"Yes, I will ever pay tribute to the
water of Shackle Island. We took on five
gallons, and never did water taste so good.

"As to it being a landing, I don't think
so. We merely threw out our guide ropes,
took on the water and were on our way
in about ten minutes.

"How about the Ashland City stop?

"According to my interpretation of the

"The basket rested on ties piled about

the basket. The rules, as I understand
them, are that the basket must touch the

number of years ago. I have been up a
number of times in America and abroad,
while Mr. Bumbaugh has made over 300
ascensions, and neither of us has ever seen
anything like it. We will make a report
of it to Santos Dumont and see if he can
explain it.

fairy tale, but it isn't.

"We could see the air drift in the Cum-

hours before we hit it. It was certainly a

Carl Fisher Tells Story of Sky Race

Forbes, and eliminating the Indiana, driven by Carl Fisher, which he maintains is disqualified. Capt. John Berry, who piloted the balloon University City, tonight stated that he had won the distance record in the Indianapolis balloon races by covering a distance of 375 miles in clean, straight ballooning.

Capt. Berry and P. J. McCullough, his aid, landed on Freestone Mountain, one of the Lookout Mountain range, in Alabama, at 7 o'clock Sunday night, after being in the air a total of 26 hours 35 minutes.

The balloon New York is said to have alighted in the same general circle as the University City, but probably a few miles nearer the starting point than the St. Louis bag.

Flight Honors St. Louis.

Capt. Berry arrived in St. Louis tonight and made the statement that it was a virtual surety that the America's cup, for distance covered in the Indianapolis race, would come to St. Louis as a result of his flight.

The University City met perverse wind currents soon after striking Alabama and was retarded in its flight.

In speaking of the race Capt. Berry said tonight: "If we had landed two hours sooner than we did we would have been fifty miles farther south. We were being driven rapidly north. But I refrained from landing in the hope that the wind would turn favorably. When I saw that there was no chance in the wind I decided to land and release my gas. I could have stayed up many hours longer, but I believe that we would eventually have been driven back in the vicinity of Indianapolis.

"On the getaway McCullough and I jockeyed for a start so as to not make headway in the same air strata with the other five entrants, who all started ahead of us. They were at an altitude of between 1,000 and 2,000 feet, and I decided to go higher. Upon reaching an altitude of 10,000 feet we struck an admirable wind current and rapidly overhauled and passed our rivals. The temperature up there was 29 degrees and despite our heavy clothing we were chilled through.

"After leaving the other balloons we never heard or saw them again. McCullough guided the bag while I slept and

"After leaving the other balloons, we

Cullough guided the bag while I slept and
then I relieved him. He certainly showed
fine form in balloon guidance, and I
prophecy for him that he will be one of
the leading aeronauts. We landed in
Freestone Mountain, near Ft. Payne,
Ala. We came to the ground on a stump
in clearing and the bag settled without a
scratch.

"We spent the night on the mountain
and brought the balloon to the railroad
Monday behind a team of oxen. The dis-
parity between the most modern means
of travel and the most ancient was strik-
ing. We left Monday afternoon for St.
Louis.

"Since coming to St. Louis and finding
the location of the other balloons landing
and the circumstances of the Indiana's
flight I can safely say I believe that I
have truly and honestly won the Aero
Club of America's cup. The balloon New
York landed at Corinth, Miss., within a
general circle drawn about Indianapolis,
within which I also landed, but the New
York, I believe, is nearer to the starting
point than I was, and upon that I base
my hope for the cup.

Marks Landing Spot.

"Of course the matter of my winning
may resolve itself into a question of a
few miles or even one or two miles, but,
nevertheless, if our bag made the greater
distance, even by inches, I will want the
trophy. It may possibly have to be set-
tled by a survey of the aero board and I
intend to take the matter up tomorrow.
I am told the balloon Indiana came down
upon a tie pile and took on water and
ballast, after which it reascended. If this
is the case they are disqualified, it seems
to me, and I am going to bring that ques-
tion before the Aero Club of St. Louis to-
morrow.

"I understand that their distance was
far short of mine, but even if they are
eliminated from the competition cup by
their shorter flight it does not seem that
they are entitled to the right to come to
the ground for supplies and it appears to
me that will disqualify them.

"I was entered in the race for the Lahm
cup, but of course the distance I covered
is far short of that required to lift that
trophy. I have affidavits and witnesses to
my landing place and also marked the spot
on which I descended."

DARK HORSE MAY BE WINNER.

University City Believed to Have Captured
 Long-Distance Prize.

It now appears that a dark horse has captured the long-distance prize. In the light of news received last night the University City has robbed the New York of its cherished laurel. This balloon was originally reported to have sought the earth at Blanche, Tenn., about 325 miles from Indianapolis. Pilot Berry wired last night, however, that he had landed six miles southeast of Ft. Payne, Ala., near Look-out Mountain. This is about 370 miles from Indianapolis, and if proved to be the correct landing place, will probably give the long-distance prize to Berry and McCollough. A. Holland Forbes had been credited with this honor with his New York, having landed at Corinth, Miss., about 353 miles from Indianapolis.

The error in the statements of landing sites was discovered when Lambert and Honeywell of St. Louis III discussed the situation. A report from St. Louis says:

Albert B. Lambert and H. E. Honeywell, pilots of the balloon St. Louis III in the race from Indianapolis, returned here today and declared that the University City, manned by John Berry and Paul McCullough, had not landed at Blanche, Tenn., as previously reported. He said that there had been confusion of names which led to the false report that the University City had come to earth.

"It was our balloon, the St. Louis III, that landed near Blanche on Sunday," said Mr. Honeywell. "We dropped to earth at the railroad station at Taft, Tenn., two and a half miles from Blanche. We sent our telegrams from Kelso, Tenn. It was Lambert and I who stopped with a farmer of the name of Raunders, not Berry and McCullough, as the reports had it."

"If it had not been for the extreme cold," said Mr. Lambert, "we would have gone farther south. But my physical condition was such that I could not stand the cold of another night at the altitude at which we were going and to take a lower altitude would have sent us back north."

"As we passed over Indiana Sunday two rifle shots were fired from below and we supposed they were fired at us. Saturday night we were at a low altitude. The sun came up between 3 and 4 a. m. Sunday very hot and took us to 9,000 feet. We descended some distance at one time and found that the air currents were unfavorable and that the natives were unfriendly. Sunday afternoon we came over the Kentucky and Tennessee Mountains. In the late afternoon we were 11,500 feet up. As we approached the Alabama line the cold became unbearable and Honeywell also was ready to descend."
