BET \$200,000 AT GRAVESEND

carnival of gold occurred here this after-
noon in the betting on the \$15,000 Junior
Champion Stakes, for 2-year-olds, over
the short three-quarter course. Every

\$200,000 being wagered on the result.

Rainey brothers of Cleveland wagered
\$4,000 on their colt Demund, which de-
feated Electioneer and Fontainebleau in
the running of the Flatbush Stakes at
Sheepshead Bay recently.

John W. Gates wagered \$5,000 on Sal-
videre, the 6-to-5 favorite, while Harry
Payne Whitney had a similar bet on his
colt Dinna Ken.

The clubhouse commissioners handled
thousands of dollars on the race, while

the bettors who struggled around the
bookmakers.
