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FIAT CAR LEADS WAY WATER SPORTS

NAZZARO CLIPS BEST MARK 42 TO COMPLETE

Winner of the Grand Prix Automobile Race Averages 70.6 Miles Per Hour. Attractive Football Program Arranged for the Olympics



DIEPPE, France, July 2.—Felice Nazzaro, driving a Fiat car, was cheered tumultuously this afternoon as he dashed across the finish line winner of the Grand Prix automobile race after having smashed the world's record. His average speed was 70.6 miles an hour.

Nazzaro displayed wonderful nerve and coolness throughout the entire run. His endurance was one of the remarkable features of a day of thrills.

Francois Szisz, a Frenchman, was second to Nazzaro, and Baras third. Lanchia's car broke down near the end.

Few Americans were on hand when the start was made. Chairman J. DeMont Thompson was among those who were on hand early and was busy entertaining a box party of American and English friends. A brisk wind had blown all night and gave the racers a dry track, notwithstanding yesterday's heavy rains. The morning broke clear and cold and all spectators needed their overcoats.

Flat Car First to Start.

Lanchia's Fiat car was the first to start. He went off to the music of a military band, which then took a rest until the next starter was about to leave and word was passed that the first rider to complete the course was approaching. He proved to be Lanchia, who thus came back as he started, to music. He made very good time, too, reaching the Bu at 6:30 o'clock and doing the home stretch so well that he completed the tour in 41 minutes, 33 seconds, hardly four minutes after the last competitor had started. Lanchia, however, was not so fast as his quick return made it appear. Dury, the second man, completed in 40 minutes and Henriot, in a Darracq, the third man, came back in 41 minutes, 7 seconds.

To the end of the eighth round nothing could have been nicer in the way of even performance than Duray. Lanchia's performance was almost as even, although he had fallen to 3:05 behind Duray in the seventh round. Barring accidents it looked at this time as if Duray was bound to break his record, and it was almost inconceivable that the others could increase their speed.

Heath's Car Breaks Down.

Lanchia made the first two rounds in 1:21:48 and Duray 1:19:45. Heath's car broke down. He was not hurt but was out of the race. He covered the first round in 52:00:23. Christi was doing well when he broke a valve. The accident cost him much time. He finished the fourth round in 4:58 and started on the fifth bravely, and was cheered. His first round was made in 1:20:23. He completed two rounds in 2:09:02, which brought him nearer the leaders. Sheppard's time at the expiration of the sixth round was 4:37:47.

The eighth round was completed as follows: Lanchia, 5:37:52; Szisz, 5:35; Nazarro, 5:29:34.

In the ninth round, which was next to the last, Nazarro led with 6:07.05. Szisz second, 4:13.45. Lanchia third, 6:23.10.

In the first round Richet, driving Renault III, failed to take a difficult turn near Londenieres and was upset. Bablot, in a Grazier, was only fifty meters behind Richet and drove into the ditch in order to avoid a collision, breaking a spindle. Richet abandoned his machine, but Bablot continued after he had repaired his machine.

Nazzaro Easy Winner.

On entering the last lap Nazzaro looked to be an easy winner, barring the exhaustion of his gasoline. Szisz was two minutes behind Nazzaro, with Lancia third, ten minutes behind Szisz. Nazarro (Fiat) won amid great applause, his time being 6:44:33. Szisz (Panault) was second, his time being 6:53:10. The loges in the tribune were crowded with notables, including Count Forcez, commanding the Third Army Corps troops; Prince and Princess Orloff Diarof, Baron Rothschild, Baron Doriwlot and scores of prominent automobilists from both sides of the Atlantic.
